The Hissom Case.

In the damage suit of S. K. Hissom vs. his father, J. R. Hissom, who sues for \$100,000, claiming false imprisonment, an order has been submitted to Judge Hervey, agreed to by both sides, making up the issue in the case. The demurrer of the defendant to previous declarations is overruled, and the defendant pleads not guilty. This case arises out of the arrest of young Dr. Hissom on the charge of insanity, of which he was finally cleared after a short stay at the Spencer asylum.

Accidents at Benwood.

Benwood figured in the accident column for three casualties yesterday morning. Thomas Trainer, employed at the Riverside tube works, had two fingers crushed; a man named Williams had his eyes burned by a flash at the same plant; Thomas Connors, whose home is at Littleton, was struck over the heart by a falling timber at the coke plant, escaping narrowly from being killed. The previous evening, Thomas Rodgers, foreman of the construction gang at the Riverside's pumping station, was struck by a large beam which fell from a point thirty feet above. His injuries are quite serious.

## A NARROW ESCAPE

Was that of William Travis, Whose Attempt at Suicide

### CREATED GREAT EXCITEMENT

At the Bridgeport City Building Last Night, Where the Young Man had Been Jailed on the Charge of Drunkenness—Fortunately Councilman Hertler saw the Man Dangling and cut him Down Just in Time.

Remarkably narrow was the escape of William Travis, an Aetnaville mill worker, from a successful attempt at suicide last night in the town lock-up at Bridgeport. The delay of a minute more in the arrival of assistance and the slender thread of life would have parted.

Travis, whose parents live at Moundsville, has been employed at the Aetna-Standard mill for some time. This week he has been on a protracted drunk. Yesterday afternoon he was ordered out of Bridgeport several times by Police Officer Sol Douds, but each time he returned, and finally at 5 p. m. the fellow was locked up by the officer.

Fortunately, as it turned out, a committee of the Bridgeport council was in session at the city building early last evening. After the meeting, about 8 o'clock, Councilman Chris. Hertler happened to look into the lockup, and was astounded to see Travis dangling six inches or a foot from the floor. Hurriedly calling assistance, Hertler cut down the young man, and in a short time he recovered and late last night it appeared that he had suffered no ill effects from his attempt to commit self-destruction. For a rope he had used his suspenders. Before making the attempt he had undressed. But for Hertler's fortunate act in taking a look at the lockup, Travis would have succeeded in his attempt.
