The Tin Plate Project.
The Intelligencer's account of the coming incorporation of the National Tin-plate Company by Senator Whitaker and other Wheeling men, was read with interest yesterday. The papers of incorporation had not been issued by the secretary of state at Charleston yesterday, but likely will be to-day. Senator Whitaker declined to talk of the new enterprise last night.

The New Hose House.

The council committee on fire department last night held a special meeting to consider plans drawn by City Engineer White for the new hose house, out McCulloch street. No change in the plans was suggested. The specifications will be ready for the committee's meeting next Monday evening, after which bids will be advertised for. The work has begun on the foundation, for which the contract was let. The building is estimated to cost about \$2,500. It will be a two-story brick structure, covering a space of thirty by fifty feet.

UNION MEETINGS

To Be Held by the Wheeling Ministerial Association.

A MEETING HELD YESTERDAY

At Which a Committee Was Named That Will Have Charge of the Arrangements—A Vigorous Campaign in the Interest of Religion to Be Waged—A Number of Well Known Visiting Ministers Are Coming.

Yesterday afternoon, at a meeting of the Wheeling Ministerial Association, made up of the ministers of nearly all the Protestant churches in the city, it was decided to hold a series of union meetings, one each in the churches represented in the membership of the association. The intention is to wage a vigorous campaign in the cause of religion, and it is expected that thousands who have not been interested in any church heretofore will become interested by the proposed meetings.

A committee composed of the following was named to make arrangements for the meetings: Rev. J. L. Sooy, D. D., pastor Fourth street M. E. church, chairman; Rev. Jacob Brittingham, rector St. Luke's P. E. church, Island; Rev. R. R. Bigger, D. D., pastor Third Presbyterian church; Rev. J. H. Little, pastor United Presbyterian church; Rev. Samuel Schwarm, pastor First English Lutheran church; Rev. M. W. Buck, pastor First Baptist church; Rev. C. M. Oliphant, pastor First Christian church. The committee is made up of one representative from each of the denominations represented in the association.

The first union meetings, it is already determined, will be held in the First Presbyterian church next Monday evening, and meetings will be held every evening thereafter until all of the churches have been reached.

At these meetings no Wheeling clergymen will preach, the ministerial association having made arrangements to secure well known and eloquent divines from other cities, whose capacity for such work has been demonstrated. The roster of ministers has not yet been prepared, but already two of Pittsburgh's leading pulpits have accepted invitations.

THERE IS NO CLUE

Yet to the Identity of the Assassin of Farmer Gosnell.

No clue was discovered yesterday that would lead to the apprehension of the murderer or murderers, as the case may be, of James Gosnell, near Mount Pleasant, Ohio, on Saturday night. As detailed in yesterday's Intelligencer, the murder was a dastardly piece of cold-blooded work, and it has stirred up the surrounding countryside to an intense pitch of excitement and indignation. Bloodhounds secured from Quaker City, O., were used yesterday in efforts to obtain some scent of the guilty parties, but the time that had elapsed was evidently too long, as the dogs were unable to follow the tracks made by the assassin.

As the dead man is not known to have had any enemies, the mystery surrounding the identity of his assassin doesn't clear away. The authorities are alert and earnestly hope to secure something tangible in a few days. The funeral of the murdered man will occur this morning at 10 o'clock, and it will be largely attended.

Yesterday's Fire.

Natural gas caused a blaze on the Island yesterday afternoon. In a house at 48 South Broadway, occupied by C. H. Abercrombie, men were working in the cellar rearranging the natural gas meter, and a sudden flow of gas from an aperture in a rotten pipe was ignited by a torch one of the men carried. The men were Jacob Rider and L. H. Bothwell, employees of the Natural Gas Company of West Virginia, and each was more or less burned by the explosion. The fire department responded readily and soon had the fire under control. The damage was about \$400.

The Wilson Fire.

The fire in the W. A. Wilson & Son lumber yards, North Wheeling, was extinguished completely before noon yesterday after a hard struggle. The loss was, as stated in the Intelligencer yesterday morning between \$6,000 and \$7,000, and not \$23,000 as was widely reported by the Register and repeated by the News.
