## A BRIBERY CHARGE

Preferred Against Attorney Neeley by Humane Agent Echols.

### NEELEY COMMITTED TO JAIL.

The Humane Officer Claims Neeley Offered Him Money to Resign Being Guardian of Etta Dayton, an Incorrigible Girl Now at the Girls Industrial Home—The Hearing This Afternoon Will be Quite Lively and Interesting.

A sensation was created on Blackstone avenue last night, when Joseph A. Neeley, a lawyer, was arrested at the instance of Humane Officer W. W. Echols, who alleged that Neeley had offered a bribe to him. The warrant for the arrest was sworn out before Squire Fitzpatrick and executed by Constable Thomas. Bond was fixed at \$50. It was not furnished. The hearing will occur to-day at 2 p. m.

The offense constitutes a felony and there is a severe penalty attached for offering a bribe to an officer so as to have the latter derelict to his duty, but it remains to be seen whether Mr. Echols can substantiate his charges, and his story is given as told by the humane agent. According to Mr. Echols, Mr. Neeley offered him \$10 to cease acting as guardian for Etta Dayton, a fifteen-year-old incorrigible girl, recently committed to the Girls' Industrial Home, at Salem.

The Dayton girl was a source of considerable trouble to her mother and the authorities, and finally she was taken in charge by the humane society, and Agent Echols, who is a special officer, was appointed her guardian. Last evening while passing Neeley's office, on Chalpine street, opposite the court house, Echols says he was invited into the office by Neeley, who in the course of a conversation, offered him \$10 to resign his guardianship of the Dayton girl. The offer was spurned and a lively debate followed, Echols later hastening to Squire Fitzpatrick's office. When taken to this building, Mr. Neeley vented his mind on Echols and his procedure, but he went to jail without any show of resistance.

Mr. Neeley came to Wheeling about six months ago from Seattle, Wash. He is a veteran of the civil war. He made an effort last night to get Captain Dovenor to defend him in this afternoon's hearing, but the captain is indisposed from a severe cold.
