## IN A FEW DAYS

It is Likely That Judge Harvey Will Give His Decision in

### THE DEVINNEY-JOHNSON CASE

Probably at the Opening of the Term of the Circuit Court on Monday, November 20—Still Another Chance if an Adverse Decision is Given—Docket Called and Cases Set in Judge Hugus' Court.

Around the county building it is not thought that there will be a decision from Judge Harvey, of the circuit court, on the writ of error action and motion for a new trial in the case of the state vs. Johnson and Devinney before Monday, November 20, when the regular fall term of the circuit court opens. The record in the case is composed of over 1,300 pages of typewritten matter, and much time is needed in which to go over it with the care that Judge Harvey always gives to matters coming before him. Even in the event of a denial of the request for a new trial, Messrs. Dovenor and Boyce, counsel for the condemned murderers, still have the opportunity of taking the matter up to the state supreme court of appeals, but an adverse decision in the circuit court, would, it is believed, materially lessen the chances of favorable action in the higher court.

Yesterday, in the criminal court, Judge Hugus, on the bench, the docket was called, and demurrer arguments and trials set in a number of cases, as follows:

- State vs. Grace Davis; plea of not guilty.
- State vs. Scott; plea of not guilty.
- State vs. Henry Zercher; demurrer argued and overruled; set for trial November 16; plea of not guilty.
- State vs. John Pickett; demurrer to both indictments, no grounds stated, overruled; plea of not guilty in each case; set for trial November 30.
- State vs. George Cooper; demurrer to each count; argument set for November 11.
- State vs. John Crawford, demurrer to each count; arguments November 11.
- State vs. M. Silverman; demurrers to the two indictments on each count; request that prisoner be released on bonds, which were fixed at \$600 on the felony and \$100 on the misdemeanor.
- State vs. Patterson; plea of not guilty; set for trial November 16.
- State vs. Gribble; plea of not guilty; set for trial November 22.
- State vs. Richard Blum; not true bill; defendant discharged from custody. Court adjourned to convene again Saturday, when several demurrers will be argued.

### THAT BRIBERY CASE

Against Lawyer Neeley Dismissed Yesterday.

The bribery case brought by Humane Agent W. W. Echols against Lawyer Joseph A. Neeley, was dismissed by Squire Fitzpatrick yesterday afternoon. The prosecution learned that the statutes as revised by the last legislature made the offense as preferred a misdemeanor, instead of a felony. At any rate, the prosecution declined to proceed and the case was dropped. Mr. Neeley's friends were confident of the outcome in any respect. As stated in yesterday's Intelligencer, Agent Echols claimed that Neeley had offered him a bribe to cease being guardian of Etta Dayton, an incorrigible girl, now under the protection of the humane society. Mr. Neeley grew emphatic in his language in the ensuing conversation, and on a profanity charge, which was brought, on the dismissal of the other, he was fined \$1 and costs. Then he and Echols shook hands and the affair ended. Captain Dovenor represented Neeley, and Messrs. Allen, Noyes, Boyce and Hammond appeared for Echols.

This season has been observed by the local association for the past fourteen years. Arrangements were made to hold special services next week, but owing to the union meetings to be held in the churches, the meetings will not be held at the association building during the week. The usual Sunday afternoon meetings will be held and it will be of special interest. An address will be delivered by Rev. R. B. Bigger on "Neglected Opportunities." The Standard male quartette will sing. This meeting will be open to all young men of the city.

Dr. Cunningham, of the First Presbyterian church, on the subject of "Business Habits."
