A BIG AFFAIR

On the Occasion of the One Hundredth Anniversary of

THE DEATH OF WASHINGTON

To be Held Next Month at Mount Vernon, with Colonel White, of This City, as Grand Marshal—It is Under Auspices of the Virginia Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M.

A notable function will be the Masonic ceremonies at Mount Vernon, the home of Washington, on the occasion of the one-hundredth anniversary of the death of the Father of His Country, the date of which is December 14. Additional interest is felt in Wheeling, owing to the fact that Grand Master Duke, of the Virginia grand lodge, has appointed Colonel Robert White, of this city, grand marshal. Grand Marshal White on Saturday issued the following circular letter:

To the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge:

Dear Sir and Brother:—I have been appointed grand marshal, to act as such upon the occasion of the ceremonies to be conducted by the craft at Mount Vernon, Virginia, on the 14th day of September next.

It is exceedingly important for me to know at the very earliest practicable moment how many Masons may be expected to be there. All are privileged to come.

I urge you to communicate at once with the master of each lodge within your jurisdiction, and to advise me, care of Masonic Headquarters, Ebbett House, Washington, D. C., as to the number who may be expected from your state.

Give this letter circulation as far as possible through the newspapers of your state.

All Masons who may attend should report to the headquarters named upon their arrival at Washington, where all desired information will be given.

Fraternally yours, ROBERT WHITE, Grand Marshal.

Already it is known that a large number of Wheeling Masons will attend.

Among those who will attend from Charleston are Governor Atkinson, who is grand secretary of the grand lodge of West Virginia, and Col. C. N. Simms, of the state adjutant general's office. Colonel Simms' great grandfather, Colonel Charles Simms, of Alexandria, Va., was a member of the Alexandria lodge when Washington was made a Mason, and was one of the six Virginia colonels who acted as pall-bearers at his funeral.

THE TRADES ASSEMBLY

Meets in Regular Session for Routine Business.

A regular meeting of the Ohio Valley Trades & Labor Assembly occurred yesterday afternoon, President A. L. Bauer in the chair, the session being the first since his election. The attendance of delegates was large, but the session was much briefer than usual.

Credentials were received from Daniel O'Leary, of Friendship lodge No. 2, A. A. of I. & S. W., vice M. F. Tighe, resigned.

The arbitration committee reported on the grievance preferred by the hod carriers' union, relative to the discharge of a hod carrier by a contractor. The report was productive of discussion, which ended in the committee's being instructed to interview the contractor with a view of settling the controversy.

Under the head of new business, President Bauer read a report of the expenses incurred by the assembly's representatives before the executive board of the Ohio branch of the National Mine Workers' Union, which was received and the bills ordered paid. The assembly appeared before the Ohio executive board with charges against Thomas L. Lewis, and had among its witnesses, ex-President Tighe, of Pittsburgh, and ex-President Duffy, of East Liverpool, along with resident members of the assembly.

The trial's result will not be known until the Ohio miners' convention, to which the executive board will report the testimony received. The assembly impeached Mr. Lewis' unionism and cited certain circumstances of the late Wheeling street car strike. The testimony was noted by a stenographer, and a duplicate copy is to be forwarded to the assembly.

No other business was acted on, Delegate Gabriel Jackson offering a motion to adjourn, which carried.
