STILL THEY COME.

Another Daring Robbery, and This Time Bellaire Suffers.

A HAUL OF \$700 WAS MADE

From the Homes of G. W. Yost and R. M. Gilleland, on Gravel Heights, and the Thieves Escape With Their Booty, While Mr. Gilleland Thought He Was Covering Them With His Trusty Shot Gun, But He Wasn't.

The epidemic of robberies continues, and Bellaire is the place of the latest visitation, which occurred last evening about 6 o'clock, at the homes of Messrs. G. W. Yost and R. M. Gilleland, two of Bellaire's most prominent citizens. The haul made by the thieves is estimated to amount to fully \$700, possibly more. The police of Wheeling and other towns in the vicinity have been notified and very likely the thieves will be run down.

The family of Mr. Yost discovered shortly before 6 o'clock that thieves had just left the house. The alarm was sounded, and Mr. R. M. Gilleland, living next door, came out, and believing he had seen the thieves enter an out-house, brought out his shot gun and stood guard, while another member of the family telephoned to police headquarters.

Unfortunately, Mr. Gilleland was mistaken—the robbers were not in the building indicated at all, instead they had boldly entered the house of the man who was standing guard on the outside, and coolly proceeded to take a lot of valuable jewelry, after which they easily made their escape.

On the arrival of the police, it was found, of course, that the thieves were not where Mr. Gilleland had supposed they were, and then came the discovery that they had robbed the latter's house.

In the Yost house, they got a dark brown overcoat, two suits of underwear and a suit of clothes. On the inside of the inside breast pocket of the overcoat is a name strip—bearing the inscription "G. W. Yost." The clothing is valued at about \$100.

In Mr. Gilleland's house, the thieves made a richer haul. The following articles were taken:

Diamond ring, cluster of three diamonds.

Diamond ring, cluster of two diamonds and an emerald.

Columbian half-dollar, 1892.

Three plain gold rings.

Diamond breast pin.

Bracelets, with pearl settings.

These articles of jewelry are valued at \$600.

Mr. Gilleland has offered a reward of \$100 for the return of the jewelry and arrest of the thieves.

HE PREFERS WHEELING

To Pittsburgh as Site for New Bethany College, Does A. L. White.

In reference to the discussion as to the proposed removal of Bethany college to Pittsburgh or Wheeling, City Engineer A. L. White, a trustee of the institution, said yesterday that he had heard nothing whatever of the project, except what he saw in the Intelligencer, and he expressed himself as certain nothing of the kind was contemplated, officially, or he would have heard of it. Some years ago a proposition emanated from Hiram College, also a Christian church institution, looking toward the amalgamation of Bethany with Hiram, at the latter's location, but it was frowned on decisively at once. Mr. White considers the agitation the work of Pittsburgh parties and he felt sure they would be outvoted by the trustees residing elsewhere, if the question ever came to a vote, something that is not likely to occur in the near future.

"If the college is moved, I prefer Wheeling to Pittsburgh, but if that electric line is built to Bethany the present location would be all right," added Mr. White.
