

INSANITY CURED

By Fasting—Miss Keating Relates Her Experience. SAYS HER MIND IS CLEAR. Longest Fast on Record Resulted in Cure of Mental Derangement—Patient Never Felt Hungry Until the Record Time Had Passed, and Eats Little Now.

Special to New York Press: Forty-five days without a particle of food and complete recovery from a mental derangement are the strange and unprecedented experience of a Philadelphia girl. Taken from an insane asylum and out of the care of physicians, this girl literally was starved that her mind might be restored and her nerves strengthened. Here is not only the longest fast on record, but it is the first instance of starvation used as a cure for insanity. The young woman is Stella Keating.

This remarkable case has a tinge of romance about it. The young man under whose direction and at whose solicitation Miss Keating took the heroic treatment is Henry Ritter, of No. 633 Montgomery avenue, Philadelphia. The two met when both were students in Drexel Institute. They became fast friends and the opinion in the neighborhood of the Ritter home is that the bond which binds them now is stronger than friendship.

When Mrs Keating's health first gave way, just one year ago, Ritter was much disturbed. It was at his suggestion that she was placed in the Frankford Hospital for the insane last spring. He visited her here three or four times a week. It was Ritter who urged her parents to remove her from the institution and let her try travel. On many of these trips Ritter was in the party.

Then, when Miss Keating did not improve, Ritter proposed the unusual remedy of starvation; but this time the girl's parents were not consulted. It was not until the cure had been effected that the secret was told.

The story of the starvation and the feelings she experienced were told by Miss Keating yesterday afternoon. She was in the Ritter home for Christmas dinner, and said she had just eaten a hearty meal. "I don't care to pose as a martyr or as a heroine," she said, "but if my experience is of any aid to science, and will be of any benefit to the world, I think I ought not to keep it secret. It is absolutely true that for forty-five days I did not taste food of any kind. I did not get hungry until that time, and then I ate something. "On October 3 I began to fast. I did not think at first I would go more than four or five days without eating, but I did not get hungry and so I just kept on. I drank hot water the first two weeks. My system had been used to food, and at first it made me weak and I had to go to bed. Soon I began to get stronger and sat up and moved about the house. "For twenty-two days I was not out of the house. Then Mr. Ritter and I began to take short walks. I grew stronger every day and began feeling better. My melancholy began to leave me, and I wanted to live. I knew I could eat, if I wanted to, but I had no desire whatever for food. "On the afternoon of December 15 I experienced my first sensation of hunger. It came as a sort of a numb feeling in my stomach, and so I ate a plate of orange ice. It quieted the feeling a little, but it came back again. When I went home in the evening I decided, if the feeling continued all night, I would eat some breakfast. So I ate a poached egg and two slices of toast. I did not suffer any ill effects from what I ate. "The next morning I felt hungry again, and so I ate some more. Since then I have eaten only when hungry, and very little. I now eat two meals a day—dinner and supper. I feel healthier and stronger than ever before in my life, and I know that I am entirely cured."

MOLINEUX JURORS OBJECT

To Being Shadowed by Detectives. Fifteen Men Employed. NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Some of the jurors in the case of Roland H. Molineux, who is on trial for the alleged murder of Mrs. Kate J. Adams, have complained to Recorder Goff about being under the constant and almost painful surveillance of detectives. They claim that ever since the selection of the jury a detective has been assigned to each member of the jury, and this detective has shadowed his man with annoying persistence. The complaining jurors say they are not only dogged, but that their business places are invaded and even the privacy of home life is disturbed by the detectives. One of the jurors said that he and his wife were even followed by a detective to a Christmas tree festival on Christmas night. His every movement about the tree, the juror said, and in connection with the giving of presents to the little one, was followed by the detective. If the juror stopped to talk with a friend, the detective was there at his elbow, affecting a far away look, but bent on catching every word. To have his every word and every act scrutinized and jotted down, the juror said was intolerable. FINANCE AND TRADE.

The Features of the Money and Stock Markets. NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Money on call steady at 4 1/2 per cent; last loan 4 1/2 per cent. Prime mercantile paper 6 1/2 per cent. Government bonds weak. State bonds inactive. Railroad bonds strong. The market for securities showed the effect of the great relief felt by the dissipation of several factors of apprehension and prices mounted upward with increasing buoyancy as the day progressed. The market closed with a burst of animation and strength at the top level of the day. Net gains in a number of important railroads reached three points with a long list of advances a point or better. Among the industrials and specialties gains were even more striking, quite a number having advanced from 4 to 10 points, as a result of the day's trading.

Demand from an outstanding short interest to cover accentuated the strength of the latter group, those which have recently suffered most showing the greatest benefit from the day's business. Brooklyn Transit was almost a solitary exception and was subject to vigorous attacks all day in an effort to unsettle the market and check the advance. But this stock, although it ranged over more than four points, closed with a net loss of only a point. The leading influence in the improvement of sentiment was the quiet and orderly manner in which the periodical settlement on the London stock exchange proceeded. Since the last settlement on that exchange Great Britain has suffered three notable reverses to its arms in South Africa, its three columns of invasion have been paralyzed, and as a result alarm spread through the financial centers of the whole world. Grave fears were felt that the resulting shrinkage in values would prevent many operators on the London exchange from meeting their engagements at the current settlement. The news this morning that no acute difficulties had developed; that money conditions were easy and prices inclined to advance rather than to decline, brought immense relief, which was promptly reflected at the opening here in an advance all along the line. The only notable check came with the news of the failure of a Boston stock exchange house but this influence was only temporary and slight. The condition in the money market was notably easy and one of the largest individual money lenders in the street made large loans to carry over until next Tuesday at the rate of 6 per cent. The current rate ruled from 4 to 5 per cent. The close of the year is universally expected to terminate the period of severe stringency and to be followed by relaxation, owing to disbursements of dividends and interest, which will be on an unprecedented scale. There was some discussion of the probable amount of gold exports on Saturday. These are not now expected to be large, owing to the easier conditions in the London money market. The buying to cover short contracts, although it was a considerable element in the advance was itself induced by the very substantial character of the buying for long account and the manifestly small supply of floating stocks. The trading did not take on any great animation until near the close and the individual transactions were not on a large scale. In fact the number of lots traded in was a feature of the day and reflected the investment demand by buyers who take stocks out of the market to look up and keep.
