

A CHANGE THAT WILL

Made in the "Dewey Day" Arrangements By the General Committee Last Evening.

THE SPEAKING PROGRAMME

Will Be Given from West Front of the City-County Building on Chapline Street.

At a meeting of the "Dewey Day" general committee, held last night at the office of Chairman Garvin, the situation was discussed informally. The most important matter brought up was the location of the stand where the speaking ceremonies will occur, and the committee voted to make a change in the plans that will doubtless meet with general approval. It had been suggested that a large stand be built on the east side of Main street, opposite the site of the Fort Henry tablet, in order to give 4,000 or 5,000 people a chance to witness the ceremonies, but this was found to be impracticable, owing to the opposition of the property owners, some of whom refused to allow the stand to be erected in front of their places. After the committee had discussed this phase of the situation it was decided, on unanimous vote of all present, to have the speaking take place from a stand to be erected on the west front of the city-county building on Chapline street, above Sixteenth, where there is room for the assembling of 10,000 or 15,000 people. Before the committee took this action several members of the sub-committee on arrangements were called up on the telephone, and they endorsed the proposed change in the arrangements.

It is proposed to have the actual work of placing the Fort Henry tablet in position going on while the parade is passing down Main street, and it is possible that Admiral Dewey and party will raview the parade from this point, though that is a matter that has not been decided definitely. After the head of the parade has reached the speaking stand on Chapline street it is proposed by Grand Marshal White to open up the ranks and, between two lines of cheering thousands, backed up by many other thousands on the sidewalks, the admiral and party will ride in carriages to the speaking stand.

The committee discussed the time of

the admiral's arrival, and the consensus of opinion was that the best train would be that on the Baltimore & Ohio arriving here at 10:30 p. m. This train leaves Washington about 11 a. m. It is proposed that a sub-committee of the committee on entertainment and reception proceed to Cameron and join the Dewey party. This delegation will be made up of both ladies and gentlemen. On ar-rival here the admiral and party will be escorted to the McLure, and in the parlors other members of the reception committee will receive the distinguished guests. Then, at the admiral's convenience, the visitors will retire to re-cuperate for the doings of the morrow. Mr. Lewis Steenrod, to whom the mat-

ter had been delegated, was authorized to secure eighty carriages for the pa-These will be occupied by Admiral Dewey and party, visiting congressman, Gov. Atkinson and others. The committee on committees made

up a list of names for appointment on the committee on reception and enter tainment, about 150 in number, which will be announced later by Chairman Garvin. This committee is called to meet next Monday evening in the rooms of the board of county commissioners in the county building, when it will ap point sub-committees and block out its

As to the time of starting the parade Grand Marshal White said the start would be fixed for 12:30 or 1 o'clock sharp. He says he will order the line to move at the hour fixed, no matter who may not have arrived at his place in line, and will recommend that organizations march to the place of for-mation at least half an hour before the hour fixed for moving.

All arrangements, with the exception of reception and entertainment, were placed in the hands of the committee on arrangements appointed recently to have charge of matters in connection with the speaking programme

THE RAILROADS.

The classification committee of the Trunk Line Association and the chief freight traffic officers of the eastern lines met in joint executive session to day to consider the complaints of ship-pers against the revised freight classiday to consider the complaints of shippers against the revised freight classification. These complaints are the ones heard in the public hearings given by the rallroad managers on January 23 and a number of days following, and others which have been received in writing from individuals affected by the change in rates. Commissioner J. F. Goddard presided at the meetings, which will likely last for several days. The committee consists of F. H. Kingsbury and James P. Orr, representing the Pennsylvania; George E.
