Edwards started out January 1, 1898, to ride a century every day for a year, but while en route from Terre Haute, Ind., to Cleveland, Ohio, he became ill of typhoid fever from drinking infected water and had to abandon his trips on the 7th of September after having ridden 250 consecutive centuries. He was to have passed through Wheeling on his way from Cleveland south, had he not taken ill. He has ridden on roads stretching from Portland, Me., and St. Catharines, Canada, to Auburn, Neb., and Lexington, Ky. Edwards is an Englishman by birth and rode a bevel gear chainless. He is now representing the Pope Manufacturing Company, and will be pleased to meet bicycle riders of Wheeling at the store rooms of Jason C. Stamp.

EASY FOR TERRY

Was Eddie Lenny—A Picnic in Two Rounds.

PHILADELPHIA, March 15.—A large crowd saw Terry McGovern, champion featherweight of the world, defeat Eddie Lenny, of Philadelphia, at the Industrial Athletic Club to-night in the second round of what was to have been a six-round contest. Lenny was completely outclassed, and in the final round was knocked down three times in the one minute and forty-five seconds consumed. Lenny's finish, in the opinion of fighting men present, had the appearance of his having quit. The first knock-down was the only hard push of the round, being a swinging right on the local man's jaw. He took the full ten seconds, and McGovern then rushed at him with his usual speed and with a couple of light body blows sent him to the floor again. The local man again took the full time in toting the mark, when, after a couple of passes, Terry landed a light body blow on the Philadelphia lad, following it up with a right on the jaw. Lenny was then counted out.

The first round was without any interest. There were no hard blows struck, McGovern taking his time, apparently waiting an opportunity to land heavily. In Thirty-Eight Seconds. HARTFORD, Conn., March 15.—Tom Sharkey knocked out Texas Jim McCormick after thirty-eight seconds of fighting in the Coliseum to-night before the Nutmeg Athletic Club. A left to the body and a right hand uppercut sent McCormick down and out, and he was groggy when he was assisted to his feet. He did not stand a chance against the sailor. He landed two hard punches full in Sharkey's face, but the latter did not mind the blows. At the start Sharkey rushed matters and did not let up for an instant.

No Word From McClelland.

Examining Conditions in Cuba.

HAVANA, March 15.—Secretary Root said to-day, when interviewed by the correspondent of the Associated Press, that he had come to Cuba for two reasons. In the first place, he desired to see for himself the working of the various departments, civil and military, and to investigate, so far as possible, the character of the work accomplished. In the second place, he desired to see as many representative men as possible, including all the business interests, to feel that he was in personal touch with the requirements of the island.

He went on to say that he had at all times closely followed all the reports regarding Cuba, but he had always felt assured, that, in respect of many matters, definite knowledge called for personal contact. He now felt that the Cubans had done wonders considering the nature of the strife that had devastated the country for so long a time. Their conduct and amiability had greatly impressed him, and he was satisfied, from all he had seen, that they were capable of self-government.
