STILL ANOTHER

Bidder is Now Mentioned for the Wheeling Terminal Road.

A TERMINAL REORGANIZATION

In the Latest Story, and It is Stated the Reorganization Committee Will be Found Among the Bidders for This Valuable Piece of Railroad Property—Interest in the Sale is Increasing.

The Intelligencer has it on excellent authority that still another bidder will probably enter the field for the purchase of the Wheeling Bridge & Terminal system, when it comes up for foreclosure sale on May 22.

The story is that a reorganization committee will shortly be appointed for the stockholders of the present Terminal company, and that the committee will be represented at the sale and will be among the bidders for the property. The story is endorsed by an official of the Terminal as among the possibilities. The other bidders will be the Baltimore & Ohio, Pennsylvania, Wheeling & Lake Erie and Washburn—according to the stories now in circulation.

A BAD ACCIDENT

Yesterday on the Terminal, in Which a Wheeling & Lake Erie Passenger Train Figured—Several Persons Injured.

Yesterday shortly after noon a bad accident occurred on the Terminal, in which the incoming passenger train on the Wheeling & Lake Erie railroad figured. The train went into an open switch at the Whitaker plant, in the eastern part of the city, and the locomotive ran amuck a freight car and was partially wrecked.

The passengers were thrown from their seats by the sudden stopping of the train, and several of them received injuries, but happily no one was fatally injured. J. E. Kirtz, the Martin's Ferry dry goods merchant, who resides on Eoff street, in this city, received internal injuries, but was resting easily last night, and his condition is not considered serious. Mrs. S. K. McLaughlin, of Cadiz, Ohio, was struck by a seat in the face and throat and is painfully injured; she was removed to the City hospital. Mr. S. K. McLaughlin sustained a wrenched arm and bruises; not serious. Otto Ruffman, a New York traveling man, had his right arm broken; moved to the City hospital. Rev. W. R. Wilson, of Wheeling, leg bruised; taken to City hospital. George Myers, of Cleveland, brakeman; gash over the eye; not serious. The other trainmen escaped without injury.

Another of the injured was an unknown colored man, whose artificial limb was broken and his real limb injured. The story is out that the City hospital physicians had started the work of amputation before they discovered the limb was artificial. This is likely an exaggeration, however.

Mrs. McLaughlin's condition last night was encouraging. Though badly injured, she will recover.

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Of Council Failed to Secure a Quorum Last Night—Called Off.

A meeting of the council committee on finance was called for last evening, at which the annual appropriation ordinance was to have come up, but owing to the known inability to secure a quorum, the meeting was called off at 7 o'clock by the chairman of the committee, Councilman W. B. McMechen. No date has been set for another meeting of the committee, but it will likely be held one day next week. The members who turned up were Councilmen Frank Caldwell, W. G. Caldwell and William Knoke.
