### Buy Benwood Property.

The Reymann Brewing Company yesterday closed a deal for a piece of Benwood real estate, purchasing from Captain August Schad, a vacant slice of ground, at the corner of McMechan street, near what is known as Schenck's crossing. The ground lies between the Baltimore & Ohio tracks and McMechan street, and the consideration was \$2,500. The brewery people will erect a cold storage house, a dwelling and a stable on the ground. The company until recently had its Benwood storage house on a site on the river bank near the Riverdale mill.

### Train Jumpers Arrested.

Officials of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad are determined to stop, or at least decrease the practice of men trespassing on its freight and passenger trains. Orders to that effect have been issued to all the company's detectives and special officers, and in pursuance thereof, four train-jumpers were arrested last night by Detectives John M. Short and Metz, the latter of Benwood Junction. Squire Dunning fined each of the four, but one of them, a colored gentleman, was unable to plead and he was committed to the county jail for ten days. On the previous night the same squire sent a batch to the jail, and if the same policy is pursued it is thought the practice hereabouts will be broken up. One reason for the stringent efforts now resorted to is the number of fatal accidents on the rail that have occurred recently in this vicinity, the victims being fellows who were riding the trains without permission.

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
