REDUCTIONS IN THE COUNTY'S ASSESSMENT

Are Announced, as Just Completed by the Board of Equalization and Appeals.

REDUCTIONS FOOT UP \$159,090

And Are Distributed Among All the Districts of the County—Some Big Cuts.

Clerk T. C. Moffat, of the county board of commissioners, yesterday completed his tabulation of the reductions in the reassessment made by the board acting as a board of equalization and appeals.

The reductions now reported aggregate \$159,090, of which \$67,040 is on buildings and \$92,040 on ground. For reductions Triadelphia district leads all the others by long odds, with a total of \$19,635 on buildings and \$46,140 on ground.

Richland district comes next with \$26,640, and Union third with \$26,855, while Liberty comes up in the rear with reductions of only \$1,930.

The heavy reductions in Richland and Triadelphia districts are largely on coal, on which the assessor seems to have placed a far too liberal estimate of value.
