WHITE-HOLT DEBATES ARE DECLARED OFF.

This is the Information That Comes From Parkersburg from Chairman Northcott, of

REPUBLICAN SPEAKER BUREAU.

The Local Democratic Committee Had Received No Notification of This Last Night.

Yesterday afternoon, Chairman W. H. Hornish, of the Republican county committee, and Chairman Joseph Handlan, of the Democratic county committee, got together after several ineffectual efforts, and made the arrangements for the joint debate on Saturday evening between gubernatorial candidates White and Holt. It was decided to hold the meeting from the "German Day" stand, at the corner of Fifteenth and Chapline streets, with two chairmen, Dr. G. A. Aschman, for the Republicans, and Col. Thomas O'Brien, sr., for the Democrats. It was agreed, also, that each party should have seventy-five vice presidents on the platform.

Soon after these arrangements had been effected, County Chairman Hornish was dismayed by the receipt of the following telegram from Chairman Elliott Northcott, of the Republican state committee's speakers' bureau: PARKERSBURG, W. Va., Oct. 3. W. H. Hornish, Chairman, etc., Wheeling, W. Va.

Joint debates at Parkersburg, Grafton and Wheeling declared off by mutual agreement of the candidates.

Chairman Hornish then determined, if possible, to secure Mr. White for a meeting on Saturday evening, at the place agreed upon for the joint debate, and wired Chairman Northcott to that effect. He received a reply last night, in which Mr. Northcott stated that he would assign Mr. White to Wheeling for Saturday evening, if the candidate does not object. Something definite along this line will develop to-day.

The following additional particulars of the calling off of the joint debates were received last night:

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., Oct. 3.—The following telegram was received at Republican headquarters to-day:

HINTON, W. Va., Oct. 2. To the Public:—By mutual agreement and in accordance with both our wishes, we hereby declare off the remaining joint debates arranged to be held at Parkersburg, Grafton, and Wheeling, the last three days of this week.
(Signed.) A. B. WHITE, J. H. HOLT.

The reason for declaring the joint debates off is not stated. Many explanations are offered, but it is believed that the voices of the two candidates have become affected, thereby rendering a continuation of the meetings out of the question. It is thought now that the meetings were scheduled too close together and have been arranged to take place every other day, the daily debates crowding the speakers so that they have become exhausted. Mr. White telegraphed that he will arrive in this city to-morrow noon, and will attend a meeting if it is held in the wigwam, but cannot make a set speech. It is inferred from that telegram that his voice is in a bad condition, and needs a rest. The Republican committee will arrange to hold the meeting to-morrow night anyhow, so that the crowd that comes into the city will not be disappointed.

DAY OF ATONEMENT

Celebrated With Elaborate Services at the Synagogue.

The Day of Atonement was celebrated at the synagogue by the Hebrews of this city yesterday. This is one of the most important days on the Jewish calendar. The services began at 10:30 o'clock in the morning and there were also services in the afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock and continuing until sunset. A special feature of the services was the music under the direction of Organist J. H. Perry. A quartette composed of Mrs. Herbert R. Heldaffer, Miss Kate Lamb and Messrs. Emerson and Kelly, rendered a selection with pleasing effect.

At the morning services Rabbi Harry Levi preached a splendid sermon. The duties of life was the chief matter upon which he dwelt. He emphasized the truism that there is work for every man. No matter what a man's place in life, he has the opportunity to carve out a career that must reflect credit upon him and shower upon his head the blessings of God and nature. His sphere may not be extensive nor elevated, but at his command is to be found constantly the means of his moulding his life to comply with Divine requirements.

The afternoon services were of a memorial nature and were very impressive. It is the custom for the Jews to pray for the departed souls at this service.
