ROOSEVELT COMMITTEES ARE AT WORK.

Details of Wheeling's Greatest Political Demonstration Are Being Perfected.

BRIDGES WILL BE THROWN OPEN

To the Public Free of Charge—Reception of Visitors—Division Marshals Named.

The details of the arrangements for Wheeling's greatest political demonstration are being rapidly perfected. The entire tri-state radius is stirred up over the approaching affair, and the railroad people are anticipating extraordinarily heavy traffic on Thursday. Yesterday, the acceptances of several more outside clubs were received, including the Young Men's Republican Club, of New Castle, Pa.; Colored Rough Riders, of Steubenville; Republican Club of 100 members, of Cadiz; S. M. Steele Republican Club, of Moundsville. Chief Marshal H. B. Baguley met last night with his division marshals, and arranged details of the night demonstration by the marching clubs. The division marshals are Messrs. W. H. Travis, first division; James H. Lancaster, second division; T. C. Moffat, third division. The uniform for marshals and aides will be dark clothes, dark soft hats, leggings or boots, and sash of color designated for each division, yellow or buff for the chief marshal's staff, red for the first division, white for the second, and blue for the third. Marshals will wear sash from right shoulder to left side; aides will wear sash around the waist, knotted at left side. The parade will form as follows: Chief marshal and aides on Chapline, south of Sixteenth; first division, on Fifteenth, right on Chapline; second division, on Fourteenth, right on Chapline; third division, on Chapline, right on Fourteenth. The full list of aides will be published Wednesday morning. The chief marshal, division marshals and general committee on arrangements will meet to-night at congressional headquarters.

Chief Marshal Baguley was waited upon last night by Messrs. Truman and Sells, of Bridgeport, who stated their plan of massing the Ohio-side clubs at Bridgeport Thursday morning between 10:30 and noon, and at the latter hour marching over to Wheeling to participate in the escort to Colonel Roosevelt. Colonel Baguley endorsed the plan. The Rough Rider regiment and Wheeling uniformed clubs will act as the escort, and the Ohio-side clubs will either fall in or march on ahead, and line up on Penn street, Island, there to be reviewed by Colonel Roosevelt.

The committee on reception met last night, and it was reported that Arion hall had been secured at which to receive the visiting clubs, and that the ladies of Chapline street, M. E. church would serve lunch at I. O. O. F. hall. The following soliciting committees will gather up the provisions needed:

Island and Main street—Walter Woris, Joseph H. Purcell, J. E. Clator. Market street and East Wheeling—Charles Seibert, Harry Travis.

South Wheeling—Oliver Belleville. The following ladies have volunteered their services for serving luncheon: Mesdames Chapman, Bickerton and Purcell; Misses Mary Swift, Henrietta Bowlin, McKown, Stella Chapman, Edith Maser, Maud Chapman. Additional volunteers will please report to any of the committeemen named above and their names will be published Wednesday morning.

A Rough Rider mounted division in Thursday night's parade will be formed. All riders will rendezvous on the national road at Altenheim at 6 p. m.

For the escort of Colonel Roosevelt to the fair grounds, Colonel Baguley orders the First West Virginia Rough Rider regiment to form on Eighteenth street, right resting on Chapline, promptly at noon.
