OPPOSITION TOO STRONG FOR COUNCIL

Which Failed to Secure a Quorum Last Night in the First Branch.

NOTHING IMPORTANT TO DO

With the Exception of an Amendment to the National Telephone Ordinance.

An attempt was made last night to hold a regular bi-weekly meeting of the city legislature, but the opposition attractions, including political gatherings and a strong theatrical attraction, were too much for the business of the city to buck up against. In the second branch a quorum, sixteen members, was on hand, but in the first branch only six answered to roll call, three short of the quorum. Motions to adjourn prevailed in both branches. There was not much important business up for transaction, most of it being routine and unimportant. The National Telephone Company's representatives were on hand, with an amended ordinance on which they desired action. The amendment was to the effect that the trenches for the conduits might be dug deeper than the depth specified in the original ordinance—this in order to escape encountering opposition attractions in the shape of water and gas pipes. Doubtless the amendment will be passed without a fight at the next meeting of council. City Clerk O'Brien's report was as follows:


