SETTLEMENT FOR THE MINGO MILL IN SIGHT.

President Theodore Shaffer, of the Amalgamated Association, Talks Encouragingly.

A CONFERENCE HERE FRIDAY

Between Amalgamation Officials and the Workmen to be Followed by Another To-day.

President Theodore Shaffer, of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel & Tin-plate Workers, is in the city, conducting negotiations for the settlement of the differences existing between the National Steel Company and some of the employees of the Mingo Junction plant.

Are Indignant. The Amalgamated men at Mingo Junction are indignant over a sensational and entirely untruthful story that appeared in the Register yesterday morning.

The settlement to be made is according to the Amalgamated Association rules and settlements elsewhere, then the endorsement of the Amalgamated Association will be given.

Among the statements made in the Register are the following: "The reason for closing the Mingo plant was that the men presented a request for a change in methods of working, which would render their tasks less arduous and give them time for recuperation between turns.
