SPANISH WAR VETS

Meet and Organize the D. F. Hammond Post, N. S. A. P. David F. Hammond Commandery, No. 86, of the National Spanish Army Veterans, met last night at the residence of Lieutenant J. R. Foster, and initiated a number of new members and completed the organization of the post, which was formed several weeks ago.

The commandery is named in honor of David F. Hammond, who was a member of the Fourth Immunes and who was the only young man from this city who died in the service of his country. He died while en route home and was buried at sea.

The commander of the Spanish Army Veterans is Gen. Nelson A. Miles, and the adjutant of the order is Gen. Axline, of Ohio, who was colonel of the Tenth Ohio Volunteers, which at one time was brigaded with the Second West Virginia at Camp Meade in Pennsylvania.

SANDS TO EXPAND

Another Building to be Added to Their Plant on Market Street.

Contracts have been awarded for a two-story brick building, thirty-eight by forty feet, for the Sands Electrical Company, on the lot at the rear of Market street, adjoining the Grand Central hotel, and near the present plant of the Sands company. The contract goes to B. F. Perkins, who will begin work immediately. The contracts involve an expenditure of about \$5,000.

In this building the company will install two 100-horse power gas engines and electric lighting dynamos. This addition to the company's equipment is made necessary by the increased demand for lights in the square in which the plant is located.

The pharmacy at the corner of Thirty-sixth and Jacob streets, conducted by Harry Stewart, was closed yesterday on a distress warrant issued on the application of John B. Wilson, curator of the estate of the late Dr. John H. Pipes, of which the building occupied by the drug store is a part. The proceedings were taken for the recovery of the rent, which will aggregate in the neighborhood of \$100.

This pharmacy is one of the oldest on the South Side, and was formerly conducted by S. L.
