Michael Dolan appeared for the company with a written proposition, which he was prepared to read, when a member of the committee made a motion to adjourn, the motion carrying, next Wednesday being set for another meeting.

It is not known what the proposition contained and nothing could be learned of its nature. It will be read and acted upon at the next meeting of the committee.

IN THE CHURCHES.

Subjects on Which the Benwood Ministers Will Preach to-morrow.

The Water Works.

The management of the city water works has made temporary arrangements for keeping the mains full of water by laying a pipe over the river bank on the earth's surface, as has been done on former occasions. There is about twelve feet of water in the well and until the river falls no repairs can be made. The company intends to secure the services of a diver to go down and ascertain what is wrong, if the water does not recede in a short time. It may be that the tunnel will have to be cut through again.

The Junior Epworth League will give an entertainment at the Methodist Episcopal church at Benwood this evening, the affair having been postponed from last Saturday on account of the affair given at the city hall by the German Lutheran church. Shortly after 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, Charles Miller, a brakeman at the lower steel works, in Benwood, was caught between the "dinky" and car, his body receiving a tight squeezing. A surgeon's examination failed to discover any bones broken, but the man received internal injuries that will confine him to his home for some time. The injured man was taken to his home at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon on the steamer Leroy.

Both Feet Mashed.

Yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock, while Thomas Martz was at work in the Riverside tube works at Benwood he was struck by a truck laden with pipe and knocked down, the truck passing over both his feet, causing dislocation of several bones. A surgeon was summoned and the injured man removed to his home on Marshall street. Amputation will not be necessary.
