BURLINGTON, IOWA, Nov. 19, 1859.
Messrs. Editors:—The day I left our city of Wheeling, was one of those beautiful and interesting days that are so rife with loveliness and poetry, that I beg your indulgence, in the mention of a subject that comes into my mind, and which is of a kind; but do they all really appreciate the soft, warm air, the gentle breeze, and the fresh, translucent sunshine that characterize our "Indian Summer"? We often hear persons remark, as they hurry along to their avocations, "This is a beautiful day," without further considering the whole volume of beauty there is in the beautiful day with a happy smile upon their countenances, as though they could not ever cast a shadow upon their spiritual sky—the birds pour forth a sweeter note—the brook sparkles with a brighter lue—the clouds float with an easier grace—in short, all nature seems to wear a halo of happiness as a mantle; how much there is then in a beautiful day! And the heart of man should ever imitate the more inferior grades of life, and be ever ready to pour forth his adoration to the power that throws over an arched and hazy pathway the beautiful day. I have often wondered if the savage, that bows in humble adoration to the sun, felt the full glow of its beams; and yet I cannot chide him for selecting that glorious orb as an object of worship, when he dispenses so much happiness to the whole world of families beneath him. Making his habitation among the gods, he makes his bed in the delicate cup of the sky, and his mind is ever with the music of the rolling moon, yet echoes the murmuring of the hill-side brook, and covers the face of the moon with the brightness of his glory, yet warms the shivering limbs of the wayside beggar—he melts the mountains of polar ice into an avalanche, yet raises the sickly plant to life and vigor—he drives the darkness from the brow of morning, and adorns it with the glory of his beams. Yea, even "Old Boreas" must flee from his spring-time coming, and hide behind the ice-bank of his North wind, when he is flying as with a "thing of life," I yet could catch a glimpse of his mellow tints upon the brown leaf of the forest, as I passed along, and wished for an opportunity to mingle my voice with the singing leaf and echoing air, that seemed so full of happiness and reverence. Joy seemed to light up the habitations of man upon this beautiful day, and all nature seemed to wear a life within the enclosure of an Eden.
At Alliance I was obliged to lay over, having missed the connection, and while sitting wishing for something "to turn up," I was suddenly startled with the information of "ten thousand dollars reward," and the voice seemed as if meandering its way out from the depths of despair. My imagination was at once concentrated upon something terrible—perhaps Brown had been the victim of a robbery, or had been in confinement; or an insurrection on the frontiers of Kentucky, and a handful of men had the whole State by the ears; and that one man had escaped, and this was the reward—or perhaps still worse, but I reached the door—
There were runnings to and fro, and long looking faces, and faint distress. With many other signs of woefulness, but imagine my surprise, when I found an individual (good looking of course), imitating Professor Gardner with a "soap stand," and between the murdered English of the soap vendor, and a notorious individual in a "weaving way," the scene was much more interesting than you commonly see with a music grinder and a monkey, though we had a greater profusion of larger boys. Our friend in the weaving way made a strong effort to convince the crowd that he was some at home, but I, though, conclusively proved himself one of the animals with long ears, although they were not visible; while the soap vendor was obliged to "pull up stakes," with a small sale, and do his crying where they have less brains, or more dirty clothes, although he claimed to have a soap that would clean the grease spots of man's character. The "weaving way" of the community, at Alliance were at such a high state of cultivation, that they did not appreciate the article, and he closed his "rigmarole" with—"I'll keep my soap to wash myself out of this community by daylight in the morning.
During a part of my absence, I have visited the home of my youth, and what a volume of pleasing associations came welling up in my heart, as I tread over the same old play grounds, where hours and days have been so agreeably spent, and the sunbeams of other days fell upon my heart, as my mind recurred to the scenes of my youth. I wandered along the banks of the Sandusky, where I used to fish for the "Snuffish and Suckie." I stood under the limble, barkless trunk of the old sycamore, that often sheltered my youthful head from the scorching rays of Old Sol, though I had many a time, and many a time, leaves in spring—and how I brought to trust that venerable old natural connoisseur in my mind—as I used to hide my clothes in the hollow trunk of that tree, so now I try to hide my faults in the hollow of the old trunk of time. The various changes of our lives, will here impress themselves upon our thoughts, and the pot upon which the drama of our youth was enacted, will come back to mind as fresh and as clear as if it had just been enacted, and stood upon that spot, for a moment, my soul was too full for utterance; thoughts,
