To the People of Virginia:

The large area of territory won by the arms of the nation, requiring numerous garrisons to hold the military positions thereof, the casualties incident to war, together with the threatened interference of two of the great powers of Europe, to destroy our greatness and diminish our power, have caused the President of the United States to call for 300,000 men to secure the nation's integrity, and if needs be, to punish, properly, the impertinent intermeddling with our internal affairs. Of this number, the State of Virginia has been called upon to furnish 2.080 men, as her proportion for the term of three years, or during the war.


