President Lincoln was not the only person inaugurated for a second term of office on Saturday last, the 4th inst. Gov. Boreman was quietly sworn in for two years more of public service.

There seems to be a strong probability that the news sent by General Grant of the occupation of Charlottesville by General Sheridan, and of the capture of Early and his entire force, is reliable.

The power to condense is held to be the distinguishing characteristic of great intellects. It was the forte of Daniel Webster that he could say more in less space, and say it both logically and rhetorically.

General Lee's measures to effect concentration. Thirty thousand of these troops were at once ordered to report to General Beauregard, in South Carolina.

These two links have been built as stated, then these 20,000 troops, coming all the way by railroad, have joined General Johnston by this time.

The greatest delusion which the North is laboring under is, that the presence of General Lee's army before Petersburg prevents General Lee from sending any force from Richmond any troops to reinforce Johnston.

Secesh Correspondence. The Baltimore correspondent of the New York World ("Draid") is out in a long letter to that paper, attempting to give as usual a rose colored view of the rebel situation.

On the 20th ult., according to accounts, General Johnston assumed the offensive, and attacked the first named column of General Sherman in the flank. A combat

of considerable severity ensued, but without any decisive result. The advantage at first seemed to be with the confederate; but it is said that General Sherman succeeded in effecting a junction with his second column, which gave him a numerical superiority over Johnston, and enabled him to repel the attacks of the latter.

ATTEMPTED CONCENTRATION OF TROOPS UNDER SHERMAN. If the troops recently at Wilmington and Newbern, under Generals Terry, Foster and Schofield, had effected a junction with Sherman, the united federal forces then would have greatly outnumbered General Johnston's army, that in such a case, not only that this junction had not taken place, but that it would not take place.

Such being the situation, it is of the very first importance to ascertain the real number of troops which General Johnston can concentrate. I think I gave you the number pretty nearly correct in my last letter. But I have ascertained some facts since then which throw new light upon the subject.

Mr. President: A discussion of the resolution might properly include the whole conduct of the civil administration and the operations of the army. The civil administration has been so signal a failure, and is so dead in the popular affection, that I shall forbear to drag the lifeless Hector around the walls of our Troy.
