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FARM WORK FOR JUNE. A CONCISE STATEMENT OF WORK WHICH SHOULD BE DONE ON THE FARM DURING THIS MONTH.

Showing that in the Cultivation of Cotton a More Stirring of the Surface is Necessary for Retaining the Moisture in the Ground.

The farmers who have been favored with reasonable conditions of seasons, and has managed the crop well, will have a fine yield.

The first of June is a sort of halfway station in the progress of the growing and maturing of the crop.

It is now the time when the farmer should be kept in this condition, until the plants are too large and the season too far advanced to continue to grow and mature.

To accomplish this the plow must be pulled on. Hoe work does not pay except to perform the duty of stirring the soil and removing weeds not accessible to the plow or cultivator.

Use a wide cultivator; set it to run shallow—not over an inch—over the top of the row. It will have a deep top of the row.

As we said last month, don't be content to go over the crop "every three weeks"; make 15 or 20 weeks, and you will have a fine yield.

Time. But ten days would be still better in our judgment. We have sometimes found that a week or more of rain is necessary to get
