By implanting in them a seed which shall root out the evil tendency. By education that will remove the excuse for crime; ignorance of head and hands has put many men behind prison bars. Teach both to work in harmony, and the way has been opened, a path cut that will let in the heavenly light of a new life in nearer harmony with the good of all. If every child were taught obedience and self-control, if it were taught the interdependence of every human life, how the happiness of the race depends on the character of its individuals, a new day would dawn on the body politic, and prison houses become moral hospitals where diseased patients are treated till cured, or confined till liberated by death.—Christian Union.

Over-helping is a danger that needs to be guarded against by him who would help most helpfully. The desire to help cannot be too strong in any loving heart and mind; but the exercise of that desire must be guarded sacredly in every mind and heart.
