

Household Matters
Warm clothing, timely fires, warm hearts, cheerfulness, health and happiness—these all belong together.

For a soothing and cooling application for the skin nothing surpasses a few slices of fresh cucumber rubbed gently over the face.

Russian tea is a most refreshing and cooling summer drink. Milk, of course is omitted and sugar added to the hot tea, with a slice of lemon.

After the juice has been squeezed from lemons the peels may be utilized for cleaning brass. Dip them in common salt and scour with dry brick dust.

A gauze veil is the best protection for a sensitive skin during hot weather, and on no account should a thick veil with spots be worn.

Savory Cake.—Take twelve eggs and their weight in sugar, with half as much flour; beat the yolks and whites separately; add first the sugar, then the flour, with half a grated lemon; pour in a greased mold and bake.

Thanksgiving Cake.—Cream a pound of butter and a pound of sugar together, beat six eggs and stir in alternately with a pound of sifted flour; beat well and add a pint of sour milk; flavor with nutmeg and ground cinnamon; dissolve a small teaspoon of soda in a tablespoonful of hot water, and pour in; pour the batter in a greased pan, and bake in a hot oven.
