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
## WEST END.

**ABBEVILLE'S BUSY MARKET.**  
Among the busy rush of the past week Saturday last will be remembered as a "red letter" day for Abbeville. The city was crowded with people from every quarter from early morn till late at night. The public square was filled with all kinds of vehicles so that it was almost impassable. Cotton poured in from all parts of the county, and ranged in price from 6 3/4 to 7 1/2. Hundreds of bushels of cottonseed were rushed on market and sold at 25c per bushel, being a decline of 4 cents from the three days previous.

Our merchants are doing a good business, and having very fair collections. Many of the smaller farmers having already paid up in full for this year, and few have also sent their balances for last year. The extra good prices largely making up for the short crop and it is hoped that the farmers will be in a much better condition than was at first anticipated.
