STREAMS.

The Law Requires That They Should Be Removed.

ALL LAND OWNERS IN ABBEVILLE County are notified to remove from the Running Stream of Water upon their Land during the month of MAY, all

Trash, Trees, Rafts and Lumber
that may be found in the channel of the Streams.
Persons refusing or neglecting to comply with the requirements of the law on this subject are liable to the penalties therein prescribed.

The County Commissioners are authorized and required by law to clean out the streams where the owners refuse to do so, and charge the same to the land, the cost of which is a prior lien on the property.

David Lowry Brownlee is no more. Friday afternoon at two o'clock, at his father's residence three miles from Due West, he breathed his last. Saturday morning at eleven o'clock his remains were laid to rest in the cemetery at Greenville Church by the side of mother and sister. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. William Wylie assisted by Rev. O. Y. Bonner.

Lowry Brownlee lived his life in Due West and was well and favorably known to every one here. For the past two years he had been employed in the store of Mr. S. J. Todd, and was a most diligent and faithful salesman we cannot recall. He was at work early and late and ever seemed to tire of putting things to rights in the store. To both black and white he was kind, courteous and attentive under all circumstances. He was an upright young man and was building for himself a character that would have been a tower of strength to him had he been spared longer. On the first day of March, 1901, he gave up his position and went home to battle with that fearful disease that had fastened itself upon him. By degrees he became weaker and weaker until it was seen that the end could not be far away. He realized months ago that he could not live, and he was fully resigned to the will of Him who doeth all things well. A few moments before the end came he said to his father "I am going to die hold my hand. He spirit took its flight and we shall see his face no more."

A dutiful son and a noble young man has gone to his reward. The sympathies of this entire community go out to the sorrowing father, brother and sister in this sore affliction. For the third time within a few months they have been called upon to bury their dead. The wife, daughter and son have been taken.

Appropriate Memorial exercises were held at the cemetery Saturday afternoon, May 11 at 5 p. m. The crowd was made up of the Female College, the students of Erskine College, citizens of the town and vicinity. The honored guests of the occasion were the few Confederate veterans that remain. The exercises were opened by Mr. E. Y. Pressley.

The roll of the dead was read by Rev. O. Y. Bonner. The address of the occasion was by a handsome young lady, Miss Edith Little of Louisville, Ga. The recitations were recited with splendid effect by the young ladies. A special feature of the service was the reading of a poem written by Mrs. M. A. Lindsay, of Due West and read by Prof. P. L. Grier.

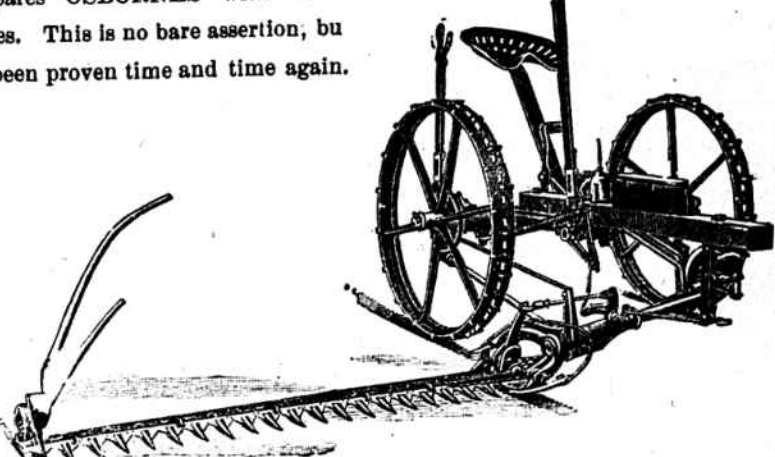
