ing the month of MAY, all Trash, Trees, Rafts and Lumber

that may be found in the channel of the Streams. Persons refusing or neglecting to comply with the renirements of the law on this subject are liable to the penalties therein pre-

scribed. The County Commissioders are authorized and required by law to clean out the streams where the owners refuse to do so, and charge the same to the land, the cost of which is prior lien on the property.


