#### In Memoriam—Two Sisters.

Miss Minnie, daughter of Mrs. Little B. Black, and the late Wesley A. Black, departed this life October 16, 1901. On the following day, while her funeral services were being conducted at Little Mountain Presbyterian Church, her sister Miss Sue Estelle, wife of William Kay, quietly fell asleep. Brief sentences! But they tell of pain and suffering, of a shadowed home and sorrowing hearts, of a bereaved mother, of a desolate husband, of orphaned children, of sisters and brothers bereft.

Mrs. Kay was taken sick about the last of August, and her sister, Minnie was her faithful and devoted nurse. Hardly a month elapsed before Miss Minnie became the victim of fever and was forced to return home, leaving her sister still in a precarious condition. From this time the disease developed rapidly with both, and in a week's time there was little hope of the recovery of either. Mrs. Kay's sickness was protracted and painful. Her sister's struggle was brief and attended with little suffering. Towards the last there seemed to be a race between them for the Parly Gates, and one preceded the other only by the space of a day. United by tender ties on earth they were not separated by death. Their Christian profession made in early youth was verified by a gentle, submissive, consistent life. After appropriate funeral services in the church conducted on consecutive days by Revs. J. F. McKinnon and R. C. Ligon, their bodies were laid to rest in the cemetery of Little Mountain Presbyterian Church. There are left of the family a devoted mother, two sisters, four brothers, a fond husband and three orphan children, besides a host of friends.

It is seldom that a trial such as this comes to an aged mother. From the bedside of a dying daughter she was summoned to wait upon another who had suddenly grown weak. For twenty-four hours she waited in dread suspense the final issue. But God was gracious, and gave her grace and strength sufficient for her time of need. With Christian fortitude she bore her sorrow, hoping, ever long to join the dear ones who have gone before.

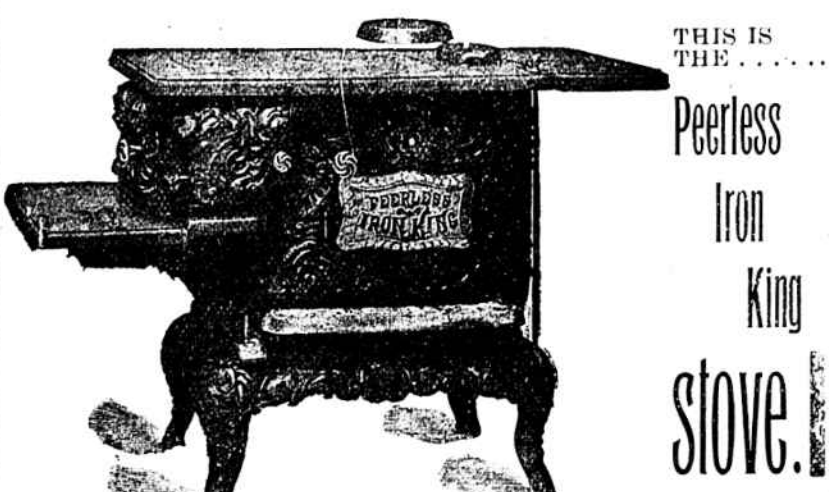
