Bradley Reunion.

On Wednesday September 12th, 1906, the Bradley family, with all its ramifications through almost every family in the lower part of Abbeville county, met at the residence of Mr. J. E. Bradley. They came, not from the highlands nor yet from the bogs of "Old Erin," but from the hills and valleys of Lower Long Cane, where they have lived for more than a century and a half.

As the story goes, the ancestor of this branch of the Bradley family was educated for a Catholic priest, but being a little weak on some of the requirements of the faith, especially as to celibacy, he renounced the faith and embraced Protestantism. The family came from Ireland and settled in New York State.

Patrick Bradley, the immediate ancestor of the family in this county, came to South Carolina about one hundred and fifty years ago. He is buried in Lower Long Cane cemetery.

The reunion of last Wednesday, though announced only a few days beforehand was a most pleasant affair. The bonds of kinship were drawn closer together and the spirit of fraternity cemented. Something over a hundred persons were present, which represented scarcely two-thirds of the connection.

A meeting of the male representatives, was called, which was presided over by Hon. J. E. Bradley, now the eldest living male representative in this county. At this meeting, points of interest in the people's history in this country were brought out.

A picnic dinner, supplemented by barbecued meat and hash was served. It was the general comment of those present that they had never partaken of a better dinner of this character.

After a day of chatter and merriment with the young people, and of pleasant conversation with the elders, Rev. R. F. Bradley was asked to invoke the blessing of the Father on the people. In his prayer he was thankful for the Fatherly Providence that had guided the people to this goodly land and had "kept them under the shadow of His wing."

He prayed that they might remain in the path of rectitude and dwell together in brotherly love. He asked a continuance of mercy and love in the coming years as in the past. As one by one each returned to his home, it was with the feeling that he had profited by being present at so pleasant and orderly a gathering.

A WORD TO FATHERS.

Lynching aggravates the evil which those who engage in it claim it is intended to correct. Reason reaches it; results prove it. But there is another class of our citizens—our boys and their victims—who demand the attention of public opinion, if not the law. We mean the natural protectors of our women and girls in the crime of headlong crimes. Some of us are informed that the father went to town and left helpless members of his family at home without protection. Sometimes a farm hand in a field near by, as likely as not an ex-convict or a negro tramp, perhaps a burglar or some other bad person, the father's absence until the dark hours of the night. In such a case, is the man not guilty of criminal neglect of those who look to him for protection?

The only wonder is that these assaults are so few, when we consider what might be done. Many men affecting courage at the well founded fears of those around them, and in mock fearlessness expose their families to needless danger. People not acquainted with conditions in the country have little idea of the extent of the risk taken all over this country. Many in the country, following customs which have received no shock in their vicinity, are not aroused to the danger until it is too late. We are striking blows as an alarmist, and we do not believe we are unduly solicitous about existing conditions, but we do shudder when we think of the peril to which we know many helpless women and individuals are exposed. Men send their wives and daughters at home without trustworthy protection or in circumstances which are a positive menace to their safety.

They send their daughters to school with no company that could protect them, by routes along which are convenient lurking places for ruffians. They permit their girls to about in thickets gathering berries, and send them to the pasture for cattle. Girls sometimes have duties to perform where they are not safe, even near the home, or carry water to farm hands in a distant field. That they are unconscious of danger is no excuse for excuse for those whose duty it is to insure their safety. These are but hints at a few of the thousand ways in which they are exposed.

TAX COLLECTOR'S NOTICE.

HIS OFFICE WILL BE OPEN FROM MONDAY, OCTOBER 15th UNTIL SATURDAY, DECEMBER 31st, 1906.

The Rate of State, County, School and Special Tax, Including One Dollar Poll Tax, One Dollar Commutation Tax.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN ACT TO raise supplies for the fiscal year commencing January 1, 1906, notice is hereby given that the Office of County Treasurer for Abbeville County will be open for the collection of taxes for said fiscal year from Monday, October 15th, until Monday, December 31st, without penalty. There will be added—

A penalty of one per cent. on all taxes not paid on January 1st, 1907.
A penalty of two per cent. on all taxes not paid on February 1st, 1907.
A penalty of seven per cent. on all taxes not paid on March 1st, 1907.

Rates Per Cent. of Taxation are as Follows:

State Tax	5 mills.
County Tax	2 1/2 "
Sinking Fund	1 "
School	3 "
Total	11 1/2 "

In addition to the above, a special tax will be collected for school purposes as follows:
Abbeville Special School..... 5 mills.
Abbeville Special R.R. Bonds 1 1/2 "

A poll tax of One Dollar per capita on all male citizens between the age of 21 and 60 years, except such as are exempt by law, will be collected.
A commutation road tax of One Dollar will be collected the same tax as other taxes from all male citizens between the ages of 18 and 50 years, except such as are exempt by law. Unless said tax is paid by first of March, 1907, eight days work upon the public highways will be required under an overseer, if so much be necessary.

Taxes are payable only in gold and silver coin, United States currency, National Bank Notes and Coupons of State Bonds which become payable during the year, 1906. A tax of 50 cents will be collected on each dog.
As so few avail themselves of the opportunity of paying taxes at the times and places hereafter designated, I will discontinue the appointments over the County, and collect all taxes at the Treasurer's Office.
Parties desiring information by mail in regard to their taxes will please write before December 15th, stating the location of their property, and include postage for reply, and those paying taxes by check must include the charge for collection.
