CONSUMPTION CURES FAKES.

Fresh Air, Rest and Wholesome Food Constitute the Only Treatment Worth While, Says a National Anti-Tuberculosis Association.

New York, Feb. 25.—In view of the constant agitation and exaggeration with regard to the treatment of tuberculosis, the national association for the study and prevention of tuberculosis has made an examination of more than 200 of the so-called "cures" for consumption, and after consideration of them all, announces that the only sure cure for tuberculosis is fresh air, rest and wholesome food.

The "cures" examined by the national association are of two kinds. The first class of "cures" include the quick remedies and nostrums with which the public is being constantly deceived. Some of these are pig blood, cod liver oil, lime dust, malt extract, cod meat, corn oil, clabbered milk, vegetable teas, ultra violet rays, malt whiskey, and numerous inhalations of supposed germicides, besides a large number of well known patent and proprietary medicines. The national association affirms that no drugs, medicines, inhalant gases, or home made remedies can cure consumption. Neither is it possible to inhale a germicide sufficiently strong to kill the consumption germ. Such an inhalation would kill the germ.

The second class of "cures" include the "institutes" and secret remedies advertised by so-called "doctors" or "professors." These "institutes" or persons claim that they can "cure" consumption, and in every case they cheat the patient out of his money. The national association denounces all of these "institutes."

He That Advertiseth Not.

The day will come when the merchant who does not invite people to his store by an advertisement in his paper shall say: "I am sick of this." At the rising of the sun he goeth forth to his place of business and none interferes with his slumber. He sitteth all day in his store, but people of sheekles come not near him. He advertiseth not his wares and his place is forgotten on the face of the earth. Who hath dried apples? Who hath baking powder and stale? Whose goods are old and without? He hath sitteth like a bump on a log! He that knoweth not (the ways of the printers!) And the latter end of that man shall be worse than the first.

KEEPING CEMETERY RECORDS

A System to be Used at Nazareth Should be Generally Adopted.

Columbia, Feb. 25.—Mr. J. W. Reid has had made two index blank books with suitable headings for keeping the cemetery records of old Nazareth Presbyterian church in Spartanburg, which will prove of great historical value in the future. The books are so arranged that a complete record of all persons buried in the cemetery will be made, showing the exact location of the grave, together not only with the name, age and marriage record of the occupant but an entry showing ready reference to the page on another book in which will be kept the entries made by the county registrar of mesne conveyance, a nominal fee being charged. There are two cemeteries at Nazareth, an old one in which there are a number of historical graves, and a new one. These will be kept separate, one book carrying the index to all. Nazareth church was organized in 1779, but the oldest grave that bears a mark is that of John Wilson, buried in 1794, although it is known that there were a number of burials before that time. There are now about 700 graves at Nazareth, only half of them marked. Mr. Reid thinks when other churches in the county adopt the system, as they nearly all will, there will be enough fees to support one man to attend solely to this sort of reording. The indications are that the system will spread throughout the state. If it had obtained in all the centuries in the state for the past half century much valuable history, and family records of interest and value to individuals, would have been preserved that have entirely been lost.
