That Grain Inspector.

In a few more months preparations will begin to be made for another crop. Rotten corn killed 50 mules in Abbeville county last year. The same will happen again the coming year if conditions remain unchanged.

In the course of time we will make our own grain, but cannot do that next year, and some law should be enacted looking to our protection and the protection of our stock from the effects of damaged grain.

Until we have some sort of regulation we may expect our state to be a dumping ground. Those who have damaged corn are going to dispose of it if they can, and they can dispose of it here with impunity.

It might be wise to create the office of inspector, of food-stuffs of all kinds. If shippers outside the State were aware that they were protected by inspectors, the merchants would not be imposed on with shipments of damaged goods to the extent that they are now.

The merchant would be only too glad to see such a law. It would protect him as well as the consumer.

Nature has so provided it that any people whether in the tropics or in polar regions may find their food just at their feet, so to speak, and that people will manage best who realize this fact and take advantage of it.

The food that grows best in Mexico is best adapted to the Mexican; the blubber and the fat and the oil of the boreal regions is best suited to the people of that climate; fruits and the grain indigenous to the tropics were put there by the Almighty to feed the people there. In no less degree, the corn of South Carolina, the small grain of our own state, its fruits, its melons, etc., are best for us who live here.

Our place in the nation is assured as soon as we begin to make it our purpose first to make a living and then to make cotton. When we do this we will strike consternation into the visage of the north and west.

When the west finds that we do not need their rotten corn and the north finds that we do not have to give them a lien to buy this rotten corn with there will be a panic, but it will not be in the cotton states.

New York lends the bulk of her money south, nobody else needs it. As soon as we stop buying rotten corn and bad flour out west we will cease to need it, for that is the only use we have for it.

Until then, however, we need some one to look after the stuff we must buy—to see that we get the best possible under circumstances.
