MILLION DOLLAR BOND ISSUE ADVOCATES ROUTED IN RICHLAND COUNTY.

Columbia April 11.—(Special)—The most crushing defeat ever given a proposal in Richland county was administered to the \$1,000,000 bond issue for good roads today. The citizens of Richland by a vote of 12 to 1 rejected the proposition overwhelmingly, the vote with two-thirds of the precincts reported and including the city of Columbia, gave 170 for the bonds and 1,900 against.

The election was held in accordance with an act passed by the last legislature submitting the question of issuing \$1,000,000 in bonds to the people. The various precincts both in the city and county voted with one another in rolling up majorities against the bonds and the result is an utter rout.

Some of the county boxes voted unanimously against the proposition and some of the city boxes went 20 to 1 against them.

At the 1915 session of the General Assembly, the Richland delegation decided to issue \$1,250,000 in bonds for road purposes. However, the delegation rescinded its action at the 1916 session, deciding to leave the matter of issuing \$1,000,000 for roads to the people. An active campaign was prosecuted in favor of the bonds by roads enthusiasts. However, it was generally recognized from the first that the proposition was doomed to failure, as there was little sentiment in favor of the bonds.

Mrs. Stone, assisted by a number of little girls, served a most elaborate salad course with coffee, during which Mrs. Lomax rendered "Dixie."

This was one of the largest and most interesting meetings the Chapter has ever held.
