**The High Cost of Disease.**

At its recent session in New Orleans, April 12-16th, the Southern Sociological Congress had for its principal theme the Conservation of Health, and they proposed to inaugurate a campaign to improve the South's physical and moral health. Enlisted in this campaign will be the leading public officials, ministers, educators, social workers, business men and women of the Southern States, assisted by generous philanthropists who see in this work of the congress their opportunity for real service.

The reason the Southern Sociological Congress is fighting for the conservation of health is to be found in the following impressive figures, which are taken from the Southern Sociological Congress' Bulletin:

In the United States an average of 685 babies die every day—250,000 a year. The graves, placed side by side, would make a row more than 125 miles long.

There are 600,000 preventable deaths in the United States every year, or 1,644 every twenty-four hours. A titanic a day!

There are 2,900 persons constantly sick in this country. This is a loss annually to the nation of over \$3,000,000,000—enough to build seven Panama canals a year.

At the recent rate at least 5,000,000 of the people now living in the United States will die of tuberculosis.

Children of healthy parents are rarely ever feeble-minded—yet there are more than 275,000 idiots and imbeciles in the United States, and the rate is increasing!

Malaria, hookworm, typhoid, tuberculosis—not diseases, but crimes.

"Leave it in the cow."


