## MANNING IS RE-ELECTED

### Dominick Beats Aiken By 3,000 Votes

### H. S. Blackwell Elected Solicitor

At eleven o'clock the returns are sufficient to announce the results of the second primary election in Abbeville County and the State.

#### IN ABBEVILLE COUNTY

The figures for this county show that Stevenson is re-elected Supervisor, that Geo. W. Calvert is elected sub-supervisor, and Evans, Superintendent of Education. In the race for the House of Representatives Sam Adams had a lead of three votes on Dr. G. A. Neuffer, with the votes from the soldiers on the Mexican border still to be heard from. In the first primary Dr. Neuffer received five of these votes. If he should receive the same number on this ballot, he would be nominated by one vote over Mr. Adams, on the face of the unofficial returns. It may take the official figures to settle the matter.

#### A NEW CONGRESSMAN,

Fred H. Dominick is nominated for congress from the third district defeating Hon. Wyatt Aiken by about three thousand votes. He seems, on the unofficial figures to have a small lead in every county except Anderson and Pickens, where his lead is considerable, with the possible exception of Oconee.

Mr. Dominick is a lawyer of the Newberry bar and a man of ability. He was a former partner of ex-Gov. Cole L. Blease. He served two terms as assistant attorney General and filled the office with great ability. He is an industrious and painstaking lawyer and will no doubt make a hard-working and successful representative from this district.

#### CANSLER OF TIRZAH

Old man Cansler has landed at last. He has seen land several times but his ship always took the studs when he tried to land, but he waded in this time. He defeats Albert S. Fant of Belton by a decisive vote.

#### GOVERNOR MANNING IS RE-ELECTED

Contrary to the predictions of the politicians everywhere, Governor Manning has been re-elected by a majority of about five thousand votes. The latest returns account for 132,000 votes, and there will hardly be more than 5,000 more, which means his re-election. Ex-Governor Blease played his Lulu hand in the first election, and as John L. M. Irby said once he could not play it again. With a lead of twenty-two thousand votes against him, Governor Manning with the assistance of the friends of Mr. Cooper, who came to his support, entered the fight to win, and he has won a most remarkable victory. He laid aside his campaign of advertisement, and circulars, and had an organization in every county in the state. In Abbeville county the organization was perfected by Mr. Cooper's friends, the object being to get every man to the polls who would vote for Manning.

The result shows that the work done for the Governor turned the trick.

#### DORSEY PROBABLY ELECTED
