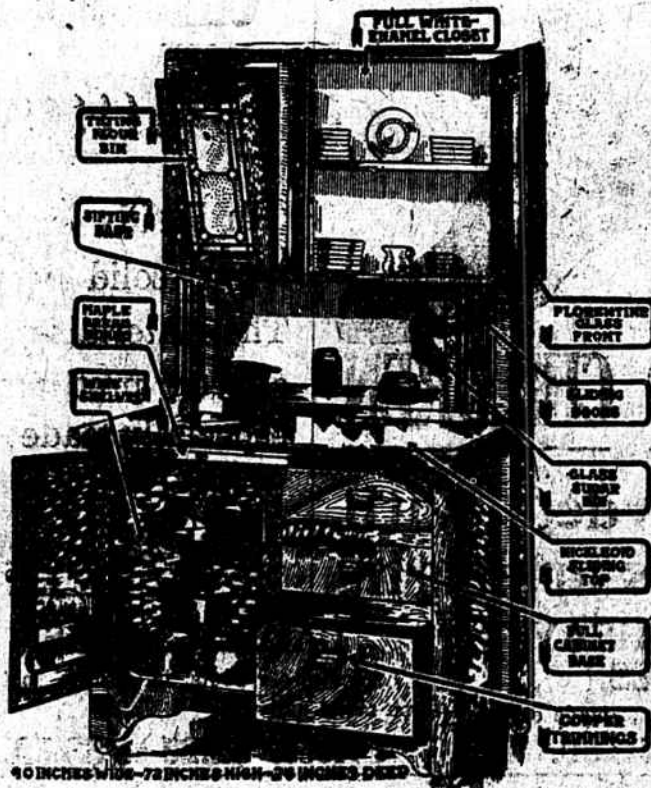

### DUKE TO DEVELOP SAVANNAH POWER

Trotter's Shoals, Water Rights Has Been Bought by Duke. Interests, Says Anderson Paper.

For years the people of the western side of Abbeville county have looked forward anxiously to the time when Trotter's Shoals on the Savannah river should be utilized and the 17,000 acres of land belonging to the James Edgar Calhoun estate opened for settlement.

Recently the Dukes have bought the water rights at these shoals. They have spent many millions of dollars on Catawba river in the eastern part of the state, in fact, they have used every shoal of any size in this river, and since they do not buy this kind of property to hold, but always develop it, naturally the people around Calhoun Falls are very much elated.

Together with the prospects of the development by the Dukes comes the announcement that the valuable farm land belongs to the Calhoun estate is to be thrown on the market. This will be a wonderful opportunity for everyone in that section.

Mr. Patrick Calhoun, President of the Calhoun Falls Co., came to Anderson last Saturday by appointment to confer with Mr. E. R. Horton, president of the Anderson Real Estate and Investment company, and

while here closed a deal with the company authorizing it to put up a dam on the land at once and cut up about 2,500 acres of the best land on the estate into smaller tracts and offer them to the public. About 300 acres lying right at the town of Calhoun Falls will be cut into tracts of from 10 to 20 acre and sold at auction on November 23. The terms are so liberal that one can buy the land and make it pay for itself in the time that they give. The plan is to sell for 20 per cent cash on the purchase price and to give five years on the balance. The balance of the twenty five hundred acres will be sold by Mr. Horton's company on the same liberal terms at private sale. Mr. Horton says that there is no use for a man to rent who can buy land on these terms. For instance a man who buys \$1,000 worth of land can sell two bales of cotton and pay the \$200 cash that will be required and then only have to pay the interest and \$160 per year. There is no use to wait for the government to loan money when such terms can be had.
