Today is a beautiful Spring day, for which we are thankful, for we have had several days of very disagreeable weather.



Other members of the cast include Vertner Saxton, Florence Beresford, William J. McCarthy, Charles W. Meyers, Lois Arnold, Walter Ware, Thomas F. Reynolds, and Frank MacEwan. There is a chorus of melody maids to add to the gaiety of the piece.
