cut to \$300,000, to be paid in three annual installments, instead of \$500,000 in three years.

The River-Berry-Mower joint resolution, to provide a memorial to the men and women of South Carolina who helped to win the war, has been passed by the house. As favored by the lower body, the resolution calls for an appropriation of \$100,000 from the State to supplement public subscriptions to the amount of \$250,000. The resolution was so amended in the house as to restrict the memorial to whites.
