Red Cross Roll Call Committee. A strong and intensely alive, committee has been appointed to conduct the third annual Red Cross Roll Call, for the Abbeville Chapter, which begins Nov. 3rd and ends Nov. 11th. This committee is composed of J. S. Cochran, Chairman; Lt. Swetenburg, Director World War Veterans; H. B. Wilson and W. M. Langley, Directors, Industrial Division; Mrs. Cliff King, Director Womans Division; Hon. J. M. Nickles, Director Men's Division; Rev. Louis J. Bristow, Director, Speakers Bureau, and Mrs. M. T. Coleman, Director Publicity and Supplies. A large majority of the people are opposed to the idea that because the war is over Red Cross work will cease, and believe that if invited the membership will be a 100 per cent for the Third Roll Call.

Women May Have to Sew and Knit.

It has been announced that a part

of the Peace Program of the Red Cross will be the establishment of Disaster relief units. These units will probably be established at Base Hospitals at various camps and will consist of equipment and supplies for any emergency.
