

WORLD-WIDE DEMAND FOR A SOUTHERN FOOD PRODUCT

(Manufacturers Record, Baltimore, Md.)

The food value of cottonseed is now receiving world-wide recognition. Not so many years ago the seed of cotton was considered a nuisance by most cotton growers, and it was not even generally utilized as a fertilizer, for which its potash content gives it a really great value. Following the development of a vast industry in the manufacture of cottonseed oil, cottonseed cake and meal, processes were introduced for the manufacture of cottonseed flour, from which most excellent bread, cakes, etc., are now made.

The most notable development along this line is the work of a Texas miller, Mr. G. A. Baumgarten, who for many years carried on experimentation at the Schulenburg (Tex.) oil mill, of which he is proprietor. Some years ago he succeeded in perfecting a process for the manufacture of a flour from cottonseed, to which he gave the name of, Allison flour. By a process of his own, Mr. Baumgarten utilizes the high protein value of the cottonseed, and at the same time produces a flour that is workable and altogether adapted to breadmaking purposes. During the world war the Manufacturers Record called attention to the excellence of this substitute for the flour of wheat, then in such great demand for feeding the soldiers of this country and of the Allied nations, and the articles published by us then have had a part in calling the attention of the world generally to the healthfulness and excellence of this cottonseed flour. Recently, in sending in his renewal subscription to the Manufacturers Record, Mr. Baumgarten wrote:

"The export demand for my Allison flour has exceeded the supply the past six months by at least 10,000 tons. On December 24 I shipped a 100,000-pound car to London, England, and they all want more of this flour, and you cannot blame them for wanting a food which contains over 50 per cent of its weight pure protein, which is about six times more than wheat flour contains. I have devoted the best years of my life to the oil-mill industry and the past 14 years to this flour, and I am now meeting with success, and the flour is becoming known all over the world through missionary work I have done from year to year, and some of the fine articles you published in your paper helped bring this flour before the world."

The Landlords' Income Tax.

That the government has a sharp eye this spring, to see that full income tax is paid on rents received during 1919, is acknowledged by the Internal Revenue Officials.

Every income tax blank has a special space set apart for reporting rents received. And this space will be watched as the returns come in, to check up the rents of landlords and landladies.

These are bonanza days for real estate owners. Rents for all kinds of property have advanced; in some localities, to prices never dreamed of. The keepers of lodging houses and boarding houses have shared in the general prosperity from rents and even the cottage and apartment dweller has made a little money on the side by renting the rooms he could spare.

Profit From Sales.

The higher prices of 1919 induced many landlords to sell all or part of their property and generally at substantial gains. All such gains are income, and must be figured out in black and white on the annual return.

Persons who held leases on property and during 1919, sublet at a profit must show gains in their income tax returns.

How to Report Rents

The forms for personal Income Tax are designated so that income from rents and royalties shall be separated from other income. The information and figures should be carefully and accurately entered in Block "E".

The kind of property rented should be entered. If it is a building it should be shown whether the construction is of wood, cement, brick or stone. If a farm, or vehicles, machinery, etc., it should be stated. If the taxpayer received royalties, the word "royalties"

should be used to denote the source of the income. And for convenience in checking the return, the taxpayer should separate the various kinds of property, and show separately the figures of rents, expenses, etc., incident to each class.

If any of your tenants or lessees paid you \$1,000 or more in rents during 1919, you should show the name of such tenants or lessees separately in the second column of Block "E" together with the amount of rent received from each.

In column 3 you should declare the amount of income whether in cash or its equivalent received during the year from each class of rented property.

Figuring the Deductions.

Repairs: Under this title the taxpayer may claim actual expenditures for small repairs such as replacing broken glasses, fixing water pipes, papering interior, painting and other small necessary repairs necessary to keep the place in rentable condition. You are not allowed to include the purchase of a new range, a new boiler, or other replacements. If the entire property is rented, exterior painting may be included under repairs, but a new roof, a new cement walk or steps or other similar expenditures that add to the value of the property may not be included as an expense.

CREEL CHARGED BY MARTENS WITH DOUBLE DEALING

Washington, Feb. 4.—"Officials of the United States" participated actively with the Russian soviet government in conducting propaganda designed to undermine the imperial government, Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, representative of soviet Russia in this country, declared today before the senate investigating committee. In response to questions by Chairman Moses, Martens named Raymond Robins, formerly of the Red Cross organization in Russia, and "agents" of the committee on public information.

"At a time when a branch of the United States government, during 1918, was preparing the issuance of the alleged documents on the basis of which it was implied that officials of the soviet government were paid agents of the imperial German government," Martens said, "my government was actively co-operating with agents of that branch of the United States in soviet Russia circulating among the German army appeals to overthrow the German government."

"Mr. Creel's bureau of public information," Martens said, was the government branch of the "so-called Sisson documents" was the propaganda under preparation.

Former Senator Hardwick, of Georgia, counsel for Martens gave notice that Robins would be called to testify regarding the assertions of the soviet representative.

"So Creel was working with you on one hand and attacking you on the other," said Senator Moses.

"Yes," Martens said. All propaganda urging revolution sent out by the soviet government, Martens said, was a "measure of defense and reprisal against powers openly and actively hostile to the soviet republic." He added that many offers to drop all circulation of matter of the kind in exchange for resumption of commercial relations had been made and that the good faith of the offers was unmistakable.

Consul Imprisoned

Martens said that in 1918, when Lenine issued a letter to American workmen, urging a "revolt against their government," allied representatives on Russian soil, "including many Americans, were found guilty of plotting on Russian soil for the disruption of the Russian government." He asserted that "Mr. Poole, former American consul general in Russia, had been implicated in the plots of the kind."

"Mr. Poole is now head of the Russian bureau of the state department," Senator Moses observed. "Was he tried for that conduct in Russia?" "Yes, he was imprisoned for a while," Martens answered, "but later released."

EFFORT TO PLACE BERGER BEHIND BARS

Chicago, Feb. 5.—District Attorney Charles F. Clyne, bought suit in the circuit court of appeals today to have Victor Berger, convicted

Socialist congressman, sent to Leavenworth penitentiary to serve out his ten year sentence. In his brief statement Mr. Clyne declares Berger tried to perpetrate a fraud on the court and that it should be sent to prison immediately. The fraud charge is based on new evidence that while out on bail under promise to refrain from all such activity, Berger took part in a campaign to induce Socialists to oppose conscription and the war.

Berger's appeal from the sentence passed by Judge K. M. Landis is now pending in the circuit court of appeals.

FATE OF AIRMAIL HANGS IN THE BALANCE

The House of Representatives having failed to appropriate funds for the continuance of the Federal Airmail Service, Second Assistant Postmaster General Praeger appeared before the Senate Postoffice Committee yesterday and urged that the Senate reinstate the item in the pending appropriation bill.

The amount sought is \$3,400,000, and if this sum is granted it is proposed to establish and maintain airplane mail routes between New York, Chicago, San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Kansas City, Detroit, Washington, Cleveland, Toledo, St. Louis, Atlanta, St. Paul, and Minneapolis. Mr. Praeger stated that there have been 44 failures in 600 airmail flights during the past six months, notwithstanding the extremely unfavorable weather conditions.

U. S. Refuses to Recognize Lithuania

Secretary of State Robert Lansing yesterday made public the text of official communications in which the Government of the United States definitely refused to grant provisional recognition to Lithuania and to attribute a diplomatic status to those who have been sent to this country as diplomatic agents of its so-called provisional Government. One of the communications made public yesterday by Secretary Lansing was in reply to a request for the provisional recognition of Lithuania sent to the State Department last October. This letter reads in part as follows:

BRIDGE BILL PASSES HOUSE AFTER STRONG OPPOSITION

Washington, Feb. 6.—Notwithstanding the strong opposition Representative Fred H. Dominick, of South Carolina, Congressman, Charles H. Brand, of the eighth of Georgia district, today succeeded in having the bill introduced by him, granting to the Alford's Bridge company, of Hartwell, Ga., the right to construct a bridge across the Savannah river at or near Hailey's ferry, passed by a large majority. The company is to be composed of A. N. Alford, H. I. Alford and H. B. Alford.

The bridge is to be one of the modern types of steel bridges and is to be erected at a cost of approximately \$60,000.

The early part of this session a bill was introduced in the house by Mr. Brand, granting the consent of congress to the Hailey's Bridge company to construct the bridge at this point. However, a short time thereafter the Alford's Bridge company purchased the rights of the former and the bill which today passed the house was then introduced by the eighth district representative.

The bill was handled in the senate by Senator Smith, and has already passed that body.


