WILL SUPPLY GERMANY WITH AMERICAN COTTON

New York, Aug. 28.—According to reports from "German sources" a corporation has been formed, or is in process of formation in New York with a capital of \$2,000,000 for the purposes of providing Germany with raw materials, chiefly cotton. The concern is to be known as the "Hanseatic Corporation" and business, the reports say, is to be transacted on a basis of payment and part credit. The New York corporation is supposed to co-operate with the "Hanseaten Ray Material Syndicate" in Hamburg.


