HARDWICK LACKED 4 VOTES OF WINNING

Unofficial Figures Complete Show Hardwick and Walker Will Run In A Second Race—Watson Has 238 County Votes

Thos. W. Hardwick is asking for a recount in several counties, and is contesting the election in Decatur County on account of alleged illegal votes. The recount may make a second race unnecessary.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 10.—A second primary will be necessary to choose the Democratic nominee for Governor of Georgia on the face of complete unofficial returns compiled today by the Atlanta Journal.

These indications were that neither of the leading candidates had a majority of county unit votes. They gave former United States Senator Hardwick 190 and Clifford Walker 174. John N. Holder was third with 22.

Thomas E. Watson was nominated to the United States senate and all Georgia congressmen were renominated, according to latest returns.

Atlanta, Sept. 11.—Former United States Senator Hardwick was within four county unit votes of the required 194 for nomination for governor, according to complete unofficial returns from Wednesday's democratic primary, as compiled by the Atlanta Journal shortly before noon today. According to these returns Hardwick had 190; Clifford Walker 174; John M. Holder 22. Unless official returns change these figures a run off primary will be necessary between Hardwick and Walker.

On the face of almost complete unofficial returns from Wednesday's Democratic primary, Thomas E. Watson continued to maintain his majority over the three other candidates for the nomination to United States Senator from Georgia, according to returns compiled early today by the Atlanta Constitution.

In the senatorial race the Constitution's returns gave Watson 238 county unit votes or well over a majority; Governor Dorsey 110; Senator Hoke Smith 34 and John R. Cooper none.

Watson and Hardwick, who co-operated in their campaign were opponents of many acts of the Wilson administration and the League of Nations. In the congressional races however, League advocates appeared to have won, for almost all the congressmen who had opposition were known to favor the league, and indications today continued to point to renomination of all of them. In the fifth, tenth and other districts anti-league candidates were defeated.

LOOKS GOOD FOR 40-CENT COTTON

Spartanburg, Sept. 11.—Former Governor R. I. Manning, E. W. Dabbs, former president of the South Carolina Farmers' Union and others passed through Spartanburg yesterday returning from the great cotton conference in Montgomery, Ala.

Both Mr. Manning and Mr. Dabbs stated that they believe that the minimum price of 40 cents per pound fixed for cotton will be lived up to; that the plan to hold back 25 per cent of the crop, including the best grades, and the movement to plant larger food crops will be carried out successfully.

Mr. Dabbs was a member of the committee on the plan to withhold from the market until next May, June and July one fourth of the cotton crop, to include bales of the best grades.

Speaking of the unanimity for action as to the 40-cent minimum for cotton, Mr. Dabbs said that there was but one man in the convention, and he is a banker from Little Rock who advocated a figure under 40 cents, and that when the question came to vote the Arkansas cast his ballot for 40 cents, making it unanimous.

Mr. Manning stated that a committee composed of heads of cotton associations, farmers, bankers' mill president and others interested will go to Washington for a conference with federal reserve board officials to find out how far the resources of the federal reserve banks will be available in connection with the plans for cotton.

A campaign of education is necessary, says Mr. Manning, in order to bring about unanimity of action among the producers of cotton throughout the belt. The men who

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met in Montgomery can be depended upon to live up to the articles agreed upon, but it is necessary to reach the small farmer in the outlying districts and as far as possible get him into line.

In speaking of how the agreement on minimum price of 40 cents was reached Mr. Manning said that in 1918 the cotton crop cost 28 1-2 cents per pound to grow it. Since that time all things have increased in price, and the committee figured that with the increased cost of production a narrow margin of profit could be made if the minimum price was fixed at 40 cents.

THOMAS E. WATSON GIVES STATEMENT

Says He Made Campaign On League Of Nations Issue And Won—Says If Money Was Used For Him He Did Not Know It

Thomsonville, Ga., Sept. 11.—Pointing out that he had conducted his campaign for the United States senate on a platform advocating "unconditional rejection of the league of nations and unconditional maintenance of principles, Thomas E. Watson in a statement to the Associated Press today said his victory in Wednesday's Democratic primary proved the stand of the majority of Georgia voters in the issue.

Mr. Watson declared his "overwhelming victory" was won against the attempted dictation of the officers of the American Legion and for the great English principles of free assemblage and complete separation of church and state.

"If any money was spent in my campaign," Mr. Watson's statement said, "I do not know of it. Of

course I paid my own traveling expenses and for circulation of extra copies of my paper."
