FARMERS USING LESS FERTILIZER Privilege Tax This Year Drops Off Great Deal.

Columbia, June 1.—South Carolina farmers used a great deal less fertilizer this year than last, according to the privilege fertilizer tax paid to the state treasurer. This year, from January 1 through May 31, the tax money is \$23,656.15 below the amount for January through May of 1921.

The tax is 25 cents a ton and this will show that the tonnage for the present year is far below that of 1921. The tax collected from July 1 to May 31, 1921, the fiscal year, was

The Hardings Have Returned Washington, May 30.—The President and Mrs. Harding returned to Washington early today on the yacht Mayflower in which they left Saturday with a party of friends for a weekend trip down the Chesapeake Bay. Perfect weather conditions were said to have prevailed on the last night of the cruise and the president refreshed by the brief rest afforded, went directly to the white house from the navy yard dock. \$165,726.41, as compared with \$125,084.89 for July 1 to May 31, 1921. A difference of \$40,041.89 exists, the 1922 figures dropping off considerably.
