## SEABOARD ANNULS PASSENGER TRAINS

Atlanta, July 13.—Sixty percent of the normal forces of the shops here of the Georgia, the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis and the Atlanta and West Point railroads were at work today, according to officials of these roads. Union leaders, however, insisted that there have been no breaks in their ranks.

The Southern, the Seaboard Air Line, and the Central of Georgia are making no efforts to fill the places of the strikers, but Atlanta Joint Terminal officials said they are being taken as needed.

Notice of the temporary discontinuance of passenger trains number 7 and 8, between Atlanta and Birmingham, Ala., effective midnight today, was posted yesterday by the Seaboard Air Line. This action was necessary, the notice stated, "to protect movements of trains handling United States mails and to provide power for moving perishable food-stuffs."
