THOUSANDS OF GREEKS MAY STARVE TO DEATH

Unless International Help is Given Very Quickly.

Athens, Sept. 21.—With thousands of refugees arriving daily from Asia Minor and an insufficient wheat supply at home, Greece is confronted with a food problem so grave that international help given quickly may alone save thousands from starvation.

Three days supply of wheat has been purchased in Egypt and Greek banks have agreed to turn over to the government, about 100,000 pounds sterling in foreign exchange to finance further purchases of wheat abroad. This will insure a substantial supply for a fortnight. Meanwhile everybody here is eating bread made from unrefined wheat.

BALLOON CAME OUT THE WORST IN LIQUOR DRIVE

Rock Hill, Sept. 21.—A United States naval balloon, which its officers were reported to have said had been fired upon near Monroe, N. C., landed near here late yesterday because of loss of gas, it was learned here today. The firing presumably was done by moonshiners, it was said but none of the five occupants were injured.

\$200,000 FOR NEAR EAST IS VOTED BY SENATE

Washington, Sept. 21.—An appropriation of \$200,000 recommended yesterday by President Harding was voted today by the Senate, it was included in a deficiency bill and must be approved by the House.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Thirty alleged gamblers were held up and robbed tonight of \$5,570 by two robbers while they were waiting in a pool hall for the returns from the last race at Lexington, Ky.

After taking all the money in sight and going through their victim's pockets, the robbers fled, but one of them was captured after a chase through the downtown streets during which he threw away a pistol and \$500 in bills.
