

HAGENBECK-WALLACE CIRCUS

To Be in Anderson Monday, September 25th.

No longer do the working crews of the circus have to tug and pull at the big top to roll it up for shipping to the next town, at least not on the majestic Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus which will appear in Anderson, Monday, September 25.

This season the circus has this labor performed by a machine and a special which saves much time and work. The big tent is dropped to the ground after the final performance and the workmen place the various flaps and ends in place. The "spout" is then attached to one side of the tent and rolls the big top onto it, with the result that much time and labor is saved.

This is not the only labor saving device that the Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus carries. No longer do stakes have to be driven by man-power. Stake driving machines are now carried and there is another machine which pulls them up, when ready for the tearing down of the tent.

The circus is carried on three special trains and much of the paraphernalia being placed on 70-foot steel flats. There are more than 1,000 men, women and animals carried on these trains, besides the many bill-posters, programmers, bannermen, mailers, press agents and others who travel on the advance cars.

Another interesting fact pertaining to the inner workings of the circus is that between 500 and 600 pounds of beef are needed each day to feed the animals. This great amount is separate from the many pounds necessary in preparing the meals of the performers and working crews.

WILL AID REFUGEES

Appropriation Planned for Relief of Americans.

Washington, Sept. 21—An emergency appropriation of \$200,000 for relief of American refugees in the Near East was recommended to the senate today by President Harding after receipt of an official statement from the state department that 1,000 Americans were in pressing need of assistance. Senate leaders plan to add the item to the pending deficiency appropriation bill. Quick action by the house also was indicated.

Acting Secretary Philips sent to the White House today detailed reports which reached the state department from American officials in the Near East.

Consul General Horton in reporting his arrival at Piraeus from Smyrna with 150 destitute Americans said about 350 more American refugees were expected and Consul Morris telegraphed from Saloniki that 600 destitute American and Greek refugees had arrived from Smyrna.


