### 86,000 MEN FOR NAVY

Washington, Nov. 14.—An enlisted force of 86,000, the same as now, is provided for in the budget bureau's preliminary navy estimate for the next fiscal year, sent today to the House appropriation committee which will begin the work of framing the 1923 supply bill tomorrow.

Members of the committee indicated today that the figure would be accepted, since the House had insisted on it last winter after a thorough investigation of navy department needs. With the committee in accord, they predicted the bill would be put through the House in December without a fight.

### CHARLES H. BARRON TAKES HIS OWN LIFE

Columbia, Nov. 14.—Charles H. Barron, one of the best known lawyers and financiers in Columbia, was found dead at Barron's pond, a resort five miles east of Columbia today, with a bullet wound in his head. A pistol and a note to his partner, J. Nelson Frierson, were found beside him.

The body was found by J. H. Lee, caretaker at the place. Lee, according to the story told the coroner, was at dinner when Mr. Barron appeared at the place, of which he was owner. He left the house to see what the proprietor wanted and as he reached a knoll near the pond heard a shot. Rushing over the knoll he found Mr. Barron breathing his last.

Mr. Barron had financial connections in New York, mining interests in the west and was attorney for the Seaboard Air Line, American Railway Express and other corporations.

The contents of the note left for Mr. Frierson were not made public, but it was said they referred only to details of winding up his affairs.
