JUDGE PEURIFOY.

There will be genuine regret over the state at the retirement of Judge James E. Peurifoy from the bench. Judge Peurifoy has held but one term of the court at Abbeville, but at that term he not only impressed the members of the bar and the public with his ability as a lawyer, but likewise with his adaptability to the duties of a presiding judge and his uniform courtesy to those with whom he had dealings.

It is to be noted that Judge Peurifoy leaves the bench primarily on account of his impaired health. The legislature should take note of the fact that the duties of the bench are making too heavy demands on the resisting powers of the judges. The principal cause of this fact is the provision of the Constitution requiring the judges to rotate from one circuit to another.

The state can ill afford to lose the services of men like Ernest Moore, Edward McIver, Frank B. Gary and James E. Peurifoy. Adherence to a custom which is shortening the lives of such men and deterring other good men from taking up the duties of the bench is no longer a virtue.

FUNERAL OF JUDGE GARY

Held at the Methodist Church Saturday Afternoon.

According to previous announcement in this paper the funeral party accompanying the body of the late Judge Frank B. Gary arrived in Abbeville Saturday morning. The party consisted of Mrs. Gary, Frank B. Gary, Jr., Chief Justice and Mrs. Eugene B. Gary, Mrs. Marie Gary Eason, Frank and James Eason, accompanied by Hon. N. George Evans of Edgefield, Mrs. Frank Hassell and her two children, Blanche Gary and Frank S., Jr., of Wilson, N. C., Mr. and Mrs. John M. Kinard, of Newberry, the latter cousins of the deceased, Dr. and Mrs. Pope of Newberry.

At Hodges the party was met by members of the Abbeville Bar, officers of the Methodist Church and other friends who accompanied them to Abbeville. At the depot large numbers of the friends and admirers of Judge Gary had assembled to pay honor to his memory and to tender their services to his stricken family.

At the hour appointed the funeral procession moved from the house to the Methodist Church where the funeral services were conducted by Rev. C. E. Peele, the pastor of the deceased, assisted by Rev. E. P. Jones, the presiding elder of the Cokesbury District and Rev. A. R. Mitchell, of the Episcopal church of Greenville. After the services the body was taken to Long Cane cemetery and there laid to rest in the Gary plot.

The active pallbearers were the members of the Abbeville Bar: Messrs. William P. Greene, J. M. Nickles, J. Moore Mars, J. Howard Moore D. H. Hill, W. Wallace Harris and Geo. R. Jones, and Court Stenographer Ralph Syfan.

The honorary pallbearers were Hon. T. P. Cothran of Greenville and Hon. J. H. Marion of Chester, Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, Hon. W. H. Townsend, of Columbia, Judge of the fifth circuit, County Judge C. C. Featherstone of Greenwood, Messrs. J. Wm. Thurmond, Brooks Mayson and S. McG. Simkins, of Edgefield; F. Barron Grier, J. B. Park and Calhoun A. Mays of Greenwood; Solicitor H. S. Blackwell and Clerk of Court C. A. Powers, of Laurens; L. G. Southard, of Spartanburg, James P. Carey, of Pickens; Messrs. P. B. Speed, M. T. Coleman, W. F. Nickles, J. D. Kerr and James A. Hill of Abbeville.
