

MASONIC CELEBRATION

Of the Anniversary of St. John the Evangelist.

Death of Samuel Burger, Esq.—It is with deep regret that we have to announce the death of our esteemed fellow citizen, Samuel Burger, Esq. M. Burger was elected Tax Collector of the Parishes of St. Philip and St. Michael by the Legislature, in 1818, and continued until his death (having been repeatedly re-elected) to discharge the duties of that office with fidelity to the State and satisfaction to the people. Mr. Burger was a Director of the Bank of the State, having been elected in 1821. —*Evening News.*

Nashville and Chattanooga Rail Road.—The charter of this rail road has a second reading in the Tennessee Legislature on the 27th ul. and it is supposed will finally pass during the session. The estimated cost of the road is \$1,500,000; the resources of the country through which it will run are estimated at \$72,000,000, and the productions \$21,000,000.

The value of the Green Teas imported into the U. States from China in 1844, was \$10,069,455, and for Blacks, 4,153,112 or together \$14,222,567. —*Char. Evening News.*

Commercial.

HAMBURG, Dec. 31.
Cotton.—Since our report of the market on the 24th instant we have had but little doing in this article. The receipts have been light, and the few sales made, were at a decline of about 1/4 a cent on former quotations. This decline has been produced by the unfavorable advices received from Europe, by the Acadia, to the 4th inst. We change our quotations to correspond with going rates, say, ordinary to middling 5 3/4 to 6 1/4; middling fair to 6 1/2 to 7; fully fair to good fair 7 1/4 to 7 3/4; and choice 7 3/4. In looking over the receipts of Cotton at all ports of this country, we find them less by 133,225 bales, than at the same time last year, and a falling off in stocks of 29,392 bales. From 1st Sept 1844, to 1st January 1845, the receipts of Cotton, in Hamburg were 37,039 bales. For the same period this season, they have reached only 16,276 bales, shewing a falling off of 20,763 bales. Receipts for Dec. 1844. 10,658 bales. " " 1845, 4690 do. Decrease this season, 5968 do. On hand Dec 31st, 1845, 4951 do. Provisions of all kinds remain about the same as last week. Corn and Meal is rather scarce, and readily brings quotations—Corn 70 and 80; Corn Meal 87 1/2 and \$1.

OBITUARY.

Another Revolutionary Patriot goes to his rest. Died, in Edgefield District, S. C., on the 21st Dec. 1845, Mr. William Cook, Sr., aged 93 years. Mr. Cook was a native of Virginia, where he resided during the Revolutionary war. Throughout that memorable contest, he served with fidelity and a courage worthy of the holy cause, to which he with many other patriots of a by gone day, consecrated himself particularly. In all the relations of life, the venerable subject of this notice, was blameless and a credit to his country. He has left a number of respectable descendants in this District. He is now gathered unto his fathers, but his memory will ever be cheered by his children and his numerous friends.

Departed this life, on the 2nd instant, and in her thirteenth year, Miss Jane Bales, the eldest child of Major Isaac and Emily Bales. Blessed be the dead who die in the Lord, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.

DIED.—In Columbia, on Friday the 26th instant, of Consumption, M. P. TONT, Printer, aged about 30. The deceased was a native of Ireland, from which country he emigrated at an early age, and served his apprenticeship, we believe, in the office of the Albany (N. Y.) Gazette. He had been residing in Columbia upwards of a year previous to his death, and had secured the esteem of all who made his acquaintance, by his good conduct and unobtrusive manners. He possessed talents of no ordinary character, which, had his life been spared, would have rendered him both useful and distinguished. But Death, the grim messenger of the Grave and Eternity, has called his body to its kindred dust, and his spirit, we trust, to another and a better world. It may be some relief to the grief of his surviving relations to know that although a stranger in a strange land, he found friends who ministered to his wants and endeavored to alleviate his sufferings and smooth his pathway to the grave. His remains were interred on the following day in the Presbyterian burial ground, followed by the members of the Typographical Society and many respectable citizens. —*Chronicle.*
