Having to copy a favorite receipt for Christmas cake every year I am sure a printed copy will be appreciated by a number of house keepers, five cups flour, three cups sugar, half pound butter, two cups sweet milk, whites of twelve eggs, one spoon soda, two of cream of tartar. Cream butter and beat whites thoroughly, flavor with pine apple, one grated cocconut, three fourth of a pound of citron and one pound of almonds blanched and cut fine. Flour the fruit and add last.

Tickets will be sold December 23-24-25-30-31, 1903, and January 1st, 1904 with final limit January 4th, 1904.
