### Closing Days of Criminal Court.

Bunyan Wise, indicted for murder, was acquitted. He was represented by Thurmond & Nicholson and the state by Solicitor Timmerman.

Sump Hendrix who killed another negro in the town of Johnston some months ago was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to serve on the chain gang for a period of five years. The state was represented by Solicitor Timmerman and the defendant by Simkins & Kirby.

Semore Davis, indicted for assault and battery with intent to ravish, was found guilty of an assault of a high and aggravated nature, receiving a sentence of six months on the chain gang or pay a fine of \$50. Capt. N. G. Evans represented the defendant and the solicitor the state.
